PASTOR'S COLUMN

As I am writing this column it is the middle of Lent, that 40 day period of focusing in on God's amazing sacrifice on our behalf. Some of us give up something dear to us as a way of interrupting our normal lives and reminding us of Jesus and His sacrifice on our behalves. Others of us add some special practice that might bring God more into focus in our lives. We began with a wonderful Ash Wednesday service led by our youth. Our Deacons have collected our stories and created a terrific devotional to guide us in these 40 days. Our Adult Education Committee has provided a number of different Bible studies to guide us deeper into our study of the Sermon on the Mount. Our high school students are preparing for their mission trip, to a Native American Reservation, leaving the week before Holy Week. We will wind up our Lenten activities with a Maundy Thursday Service of Worship on April 17th at 7PM. Eventually it will be time to give up Lent as it makes way for the joy of Easter morning.

I am so proud of all the extra activity around our church. We even have people making our Church directory a fun reflection of all the individual costumes and things that give us our unique identities. Then, before we know it Easter will be here in all it's glory. It is a time to break all our fasting with the deep celebration, not simply that Jesus came alive, but because of His mission to the cross, and His sacrifice, He assures us of our resurrection with Him. We will host two identical worship services at

8 and 10 AM. You'll want to be here with the church family. Otherwise, you might miss Jesus, like the little boy, in the following story:

It was Palm Sunday, and a little five-year-old boy had to stay home from church, because he was sick. When his sisters returned home carrying palm branches, he asked what they were for. His mother explained, "People waved them over Jesus' head as he walked by." "Wouldn't you know it," the boy said, "The one Sunday I don't go, Jesus shows up!"

Jesus shows up every Sunday to bring us hope and joy as we bring our worship to Him. I hope you are inviting friends and family to worship with you during Holy Week.

May the joy of our Risen Lord fill your hearts and minds with His love!

HOW WE CHRISTIANS HAVE TAKEN OURSELVES OUT OF EASTER by Roland Wrinkle

For Advent, I wrote about "How We Christians Have Taken The Christ Out Of Christmas" by de-emphasizing the biblical notion, as hammered home by the original witnesses and early Church Fathers, that "Christ" refers to the risen Messiah of Israel as promised to the world in Gen. 12:3 and throughout the continuing narrative of scripture. I wanted to address what I believe to be a wrongheaded way of approaching our understanding of the Bible by continuing to frame things in an "either-or" manner (either Messiah or Savior) instead of a "This and That as well" method (Messiah and Savior and much, much more). One biblical truth should never be allowed to crowd out another biblical truth. The Gospel is much too expansive and revolutionary a world-view to be confined to a bumper sticker or slogan. Remember how Jack came up with "Joyous Messiah Mass" instead of "Merry Christmas"? Now, I would like to do the same for Easter.

Education

I believe that we have limited Easter to be only about the resurrection of Jesus of Nazareth. Let's get one thing straight at the start—for I am frequently misunderstood when I say such things. The resurrection of the Messiah of Israel and the King of the World is the single most important event in human history since God launched His promised plan to rescue and restore all of fallen creation. It was a moment when the past and the future came flooding into the present—when the Kingdom of God first came down to earth (as we pray every day in the Lord's Prayer), where we started living out the anticipation of the culmination of that Kingdom here and now, not waiting for some "glad morning" when we will be rescued from this earth and this life ("I'll fly away") and when we can truly lead "resurrection lives" having shared, as Paul said, in both His death and in His resurrection ("All of us who have been baptized into the Messiah Jesus were baptized into his death…[and], if we have been united with him in a death like his, we will certainly be united with him in a resurrection like his." -Rom. 6). If Jesus had not been resurrected from the dead, then God's plan would be in shambles and we'd be in pretty tough shape.

But it is not *only* the resurrection of Jesus that we should anticipate during Lent and celebrate on Easter (and, for that matter, celebrate every Sunday and, for even that matter, celebrate every day we live and breathe under grace). Here's what we have a tendency to omit, (or forget about): Jesus was raised as the first fruits of OUR OWN RESURRECTION. This is commonly referred to as the "general resurrection" and comes directly from the entire sweep and scope of the Bible as well as passage after passage after passage.

The fact that Jesus came back from the dead is a great thing—for Jesus. But what about us? That's very nice for Jesus of Nazareth, but what about the children of God-those whom He came to save and for whom He died? Well, here it is: "The resurrection of the Messiah was] the first fruits of those who have died. For since death came through a human being, the resurrection of the dead has also come through a human being; for as all die in Adam, so all will be made alive in Christ. But each in his own order: Christ the first fruits, then at his coming those who belong to Christ." (1 Cor. 15) Paul not only says this to us but also says that this doctrine is the cornerstone of our faith, without which the whole thing collapses and we become a mere social club which does good things: "If Christ (the Messiah) has not been raised, then what we have been preaching has been in vain and our faith has been in vain and we were misrepresenting God.... If for this life only we have hoped in Christ, we are of all people most to be pitied." But (thank God) He goes on straight away to declare. "But in fact Christ has been raised from the dead..." and, therefore, so shall we! In Peter's second sermon in Acts (3:17) the head apostle is explaining to the newborn church what the death and resurrection of Jesus really meant: "Repent ... so...that he may send the Messiah appointed for you, that is, Jesus, who must remain in heaven until the time of universal restoration that God announced long ago through his holy prophets." This is the message that Paul had for the Thessalonians in one of his earliest writings: "For the Lord himself, with a cry of command, with the archangel's call and with the sound of God's trumpet, will descend from heaven, and the dead in Christ will rise first". The prophetic book of Daniel (so heavily relied upon by the New Testament writers and authored a half millennia before any of these events) ends on this note of prominence: "But you, go your way, and rest; you shall rise for your reward at the end of the days."

Friends, this is what God promised from the very beginning and which He held in His mind throughout all of the unfolding of His grand plan. Easter is itself the beginning of that resurrection, where the promised new creation comes bursting in on a decaying and surprised world-a new creation which is not filled with disembodied spiritual beings wafting about in ethereal bliss but, rather with real live "fully human" people (i.e. us) who eat, love and glorify God and are filled with the physical life of a restored merger of heaven and earth.

Traditionally, on Easter, we call and respond with, "He has risen!" and "He has risen indeed!" I intend this Easter to simply add to the response "—and, therefore, so shall we."



Praying is a prominent part of being a Deacon. When I was a young man in catechism at Our Lady of Lourdes Catholic Church in Northridge, I cannot ever remember praying out loud. When we did pray, it was always with our heads bowed, our hands together, and listening to a priest or our teachers pray. We never prayed out loud in public. At home the only praying we did out loud as kids (my 4 brothers and I) was at the dinner table and it was always the same prayer. "Bless Us Oh Lord for the food for which we are about to receive from the bountiful hands of Christ our Lord, Amen." Short, sweet and to the point.

Fast forward us to 1996 and newly connected to First Presbyterian Church of Newhall. The congregation prayed aloud every week reading from our programs, still well within our "comfort zone." Three years later I found myself being called to the Deacon Board under a wonderful man and Deacon Jay Headley. He always offered us a chance to pray aloud at the opening and closing of the Deacon Board meeting. A couple of times during my three years of being a Deacon, I stepped up and said our prayer stumbling and getting tongue tied, but I got through it and I was heard Through that experience I learned one big thing about praying. The most important thing is that every prayer is valid, from your heart to God's ear. It has nothing to do with how it gets there. Just get it there.

We all pray in church together and on our own. Most of us pray in our private lives, whether it's before a meal or before we go to bed. There is never a bad or inappropriate time to pray. Prayers can't be answered if they're not asked.

I now pray every morning. I pray before I even get out of bed. I sit on the side my bed and pray, I thank God for waking me up and allowing me to live here and now. I thank God for getting me through yesterday, and all the good things that have happened. Then, I pray he will protect me and my family. I ask for his protection. I ask him to guide my kids to good decisions. And to bring good things to them. And finally I pray for all the people and things (large and small) that make my life the joy that it is.

I pray every morning when I leave for work for him to give me patience and a safe journey to Pasadena. And I say a similar prayer when I leave work as well (because the 210 freeway is where all the procrastinators and slowpokes tend to gather around 6:00pm) so I pray for patience.

I also pray, if only for one quick moment before every meal. Even though it is not audible to those around me, God hears my thanks. I especially need to pray before dinner when we have guests in our home. It lets me show all those who dine with us that we appreciated them and their presence in our home and lives.

So when something is important to you, let God know. The only way he will know is if you pray. So simple!



We are always excited to offer cake when special *landmark birthdays* come along. We provide *flowers in the Sanctuary* for special anniversaries and birthdays.





This year we have begun giving to the **Tempered Steels Wounded Warriors** as well as our local **Salvation Army** We are also always looking for new ways to serve not just our church community, but our local community as well.

Each Holiday season we raise money by selling our First Presbyterian Church of Newhall *Christmas ornaments* and *Christmas cards*. That money goes into the Deacon General fund. We also sponsor a *Deacon Fund offering* around the beginning of each season.



We provide little "Thank Yous" to Moms on *Mothers Day* and Dads on *Fathers Day*. We acknowledge each of our youth moving on through High School and College *Graduations*.

We also offer some *financial help* to parishioners who are in need of temporary assistance—when they just can't seem make ends meet.

STEPHEN MINISTRY

A Stephen Minister comes alongside a hurting person and meets with that person, generally on a weekly basis, to listen, care, encourage, pray, and provide emotional and spiritual support. Because of the confidentiality of this ministry, you probably will never hear about the good works being done throughout our church, but since 2010, our church's program has had 34 people complete training, and our commissioned Stephen Ministers have served 35 individuals in our church and our community.



In addition, our Stephen Ministers have formed a team which we call S.M.A.S.H. (<u>Stephen Ministers Are Supporting Hospitalizations</u>). The S.M.A.S.H. team provides loving support to people who need short-term care to reduce isolation while "under the weather."

Also if anyone needs prayer and/or support on a Sunday Morning, they can look for Stephen Ministers identified by their badges in the patio area after both services.

First Presbyterian Church of Newhall has a covenant with the Stephen Ministries organization which allows our congregation to send delegates to Stephen Ministry Leader Training and to conduct Stephen Ministry trainings.

Stephen Ministries is an independent, not-for-profit trans-denominational Christian educational organization, founded in 1975 and based in St. Louis, Missouri. The organization's name is from Acts 6, where Stephen was chosen to provide caring ministry to those in need.

Stephen Ministers are Christian men and women who are trained to provide one-to-one care to people experiencing a difficult time in life, such as grief, divorce, job loss, chronic or terminal illness, relocation, etc. The Stephen Ministries organization has more than 600,000 people who have completed training in over 11,000 congregations. At First Pres, we are currently in our third training with 10 people attending.



NEW DIRECTIONS

Carolyn Ritchie recognized the need to provide a support group for widows in our congregation, and she formed the group, New Directions, for that purpose. The following is Carolyn's summary of this ministry.

For eight years New Directions has been available for those who wish to join other women following the loss of their husband.
