Pastor Column April 2016

A Preacher by the name of David H. C. Read once preached a sermon titled, "Unfinished Easter." As you read this, our Easter celebration will once again be behind us. We've put away our plastic Easter Eggs to save them for next year. The Easter clothes we wore have given way to regular outfits. Our celebrations over breaking our Lenten fasts are behind us as we rush toward summer. So excuse me if I linger a bit as it seems that we put away Easter a little too quickly each year.

I remember an idea expressed by author Philip Yancey in his book, <u>The Jesus I</u> Never Knew;

"Presumably [Jesus] could have had any resurrected body he wanted, and yet he chose one identifiable mainly by scars that could be seen and touched. Why?

I believe the story of Easter would be incomplete without those scars on the hands, the feet, and the side of Jesus. When human beings fantasize, we dream of pearly straight teeth and wrinkle-free skin and sexy ideal shapes. We dream of an unnatural state: the perfect body. But for Jesus, being confined in a skeleton and human skin WAS the unnatural state. The scars are, to him, an emblem of life on our planet, a permanent reminder of those days of confinement and suffering.

I take hope in Jesus' scars. From the perspective of heaven, they represent the most horrible event that has ever happened in the history of the universe - the crucifixion - Easter turned into a memory. Because of Easter, I can hope that the tears we shed, the blows we receive, the emotional pain, the heartache over lost friends and loved ones, all these will become memories, like Jesus' scars. Scars never completely go away, but neither do they hurt any longer. We will have recreated bodies, a re-created heaven and earth. We will have a new start, an Easter start."

Spring is in full bloom (whatever that means in Southern California), and the newness of life is once again evident in nature, but our bodies have the scars of living through numerous winters when life is hard and hurts. Yet as we hold our scars up before our eyes, they don't tell the final story. Jesus has already written the final chapter for us all. We could say, (as C.S. Lewis does in the Chronicles of Narnia), that actually only the prelude is concluded and we have the main adventure ahead of us, one of enjoying the new earth as the main novel.

But until that time the phrase "Unfinished Easter" carries with it a meaning which Yancey suggests—that now as we continue to hope (and work) for the promised renewed earth that God has for our future, "The pen is in our hands."

### Church Life Trip to the Nethercutt Museum Saturday, February 27th 2016

It was as a beautiful day as you could ask for as First Presbyterian Church of Newhall sent 14 of its members to view the Nethercutt Collection.

The **Nethercutt Collection** is a museum located in **Sylmar**. Its centerpiece is its automobile collection, which has led Autoweek to call the Nethercutt one of America's five greatest automobile museums. The Nethercutt also houses collections of mechanical musical instruments, including orchestrions, player pianos and music boxes, and antique furniture. There are also two older-model railroad cars.

We came together at 9:00 on Saturday February 27<sup>th</sup>, enjoyed a continental breakfast and then carpooled about 8 miles south to Sylmar.

We immediately met in The Lower Salon where we assembled to start the guided tour. The salon is a microcosm of the entire collection. There are about 25 automobiles dating from the early 1900's up till the late 1940's. Also on display are nickelodeons, music boxes, David Winter cottages, dolls, coins, and crystal figurines.

We then moved upstairs, where marble columns, crystal chandeliers, and painted ceilings all make up this beautiful Grand Salon Showroom of the 1910s, 20s and 30s. On display are approx. 30 of the finest automobiles of that era. Duesenbergs, Cadillacs, Isotta-Fraschini, Delahaye, Minvera, Renault, Maybach, many other European- and American-built automobiles.

Here we all had our favorites, I fell in love with a Yellow 1934 Packard, a GORGEOUS car. They wouldn't let me drive it.... Rats!

We then ascended to the Mezzanine, where there is a large assortment of Radiator Hood Ornaments, "Mascots", including Lalique Crystal Mascots and 18th & 19th Century French Furniture. We listened to a variety of vintage phonographs and the like.

When we were finally ready, we walked a gorgeous spiral staircase about 3 stories up to the Nethercutt Music Room. There we enjoyed a collection of automated mechanical instruments including Reproducing Pianos, Nickelodeons, and Cylinder and Disc Music Boxes, Orchestrions and the Mighty Wurlitzer Theatre Pipe Organ. During the tour we were blessed to enjoy some of these instruments as they were demonstrated, including a miniconcert on the Wurlitzer Pipe Organ. Also on display is a beautiful Louis XV Style Dining Room.

Then we promptly descended to the Grand Salon, and crossed the street and enjoyed time in the Main Nethercutt Automobile Museum where they showcase more than 130 of the world's greatest antique, vintage, classic and special interest automobiles.

We stepped outside the Museum to a perfectly restored steam locomotive and a Private Car, which was owned by the eldest daughter of Santa Anita Race Track founder, E.J. "Lucky" Baldwin.

We then returned to Newhall to unwind and enjoy a nice lunch at our local Cathy's Deli Restaurant. A great time was had by all, and we all felt so blessed to share this wonderful collection. We encourage all of you to enjoy this magnificent display only minutes from our church, and the best part about it.... It's FREE!

### Laos Thank You

Back in January 2016, First Presbyterian Church of Newhall got to hear from two of our very own, Jack Irwin and Art Moore, as they discussed their experience building an intricate water system in the village of Yod Kuea in the Norther Providence of Xieng Khaung. In cooperation with the Lao Evangelical Church and in collaboration with Charlie, John and Lorna from University Presbyterian Church in Fresno, they traveled together to Laos November 9<sup>th</sup>-25<sup>th</sup>, 2015 to install this water system in hopes of not only bringing a better living situation for the people of Yod Kuea, but also to build a better relationship between America and Laos.

Laos was heavily bombed during the Vietnam War. There are countless areas of ammunition dumps where craters from bombs can be found (even today), and the people use the shell casings for different purposes from home improvements to gardening. The Laotians called the Vietnam War the American War. I can tell you from firsthand experience that war is never clear, the enemy is hard to see, and the purpose can get muddled after some time has passed without substantial progress.

The clean water system that was installed by the warm hands and hearts of the group will allow the people of Yod Kuea in Laos to have everlasting clean water for cooking, cleaning, and infant care. The need for clean water is of great value in fighting sickness, survival, and other potential hazards. This mission was successfully funded outside the mission budget by those who contributed directly to the church fund for the Laos project. Thank you to everyone who continues their efforts in rebuilding hope in the lives of thousands inside and outside of our country. From Mexico to Laos, none of this could have been done without your support. Thank you congregation, thank you missionaries, and especially thank you to Jack and Art for following by example the message that Jesus gave his disciples.

### **BLESSINGS OF CHURCH LANDSCAPE BEAUTIFICATION IN 2016**

Building and Grounds Committee is excited to share plans for a **Church Landscape Beautification Project**. It will involve a bit of groundwork (pun intended) which is in process now. The plan was designed by local Landscape Designer Brenda Wadsworth. The project will be completed in stages.

We will start all along the front of the Church on Newhall Avenue. The two dead Elm Trees have been removed. The grass will be removed from the street to the parallel concrete path. The area will be rototilled and amendments will be added prior to planting beautiful drought resistant plants. Irrigation and water concerns have been considered and approved.

It is a beautiful landscape plan. When completed, we will have an impressive, strong statement to the citizens of Santa Clarita that we are here and that we have Presbyterian Pride in our church!

Within the Landscape Plan is a revising of the Meditation Area under our giant Carrotwood Tree between the Coffee Kiosk and Fellowship Hall. This will be an area where we can come to meditate, congregate, and pray. We will have plants that are mentioned in the Bible here in this area. There will be benches to sit on and maybe even a meditative water statement.

We will eventually rework all the landscape areas of our impressive property grounds (even the Market Street House!).

Long term ground maintenance will be our challenge. We have formed a Garden Group that will need to grow (pun intended). We gather periodically to trim, weed, fertilize and water. It is a very gratifying to be involved with this group. Recently the Boy Scout Troop, their parents, the Saturday Men at Work boys and the Garden Group planted, cleared out dead plants, weeded and trimmed. Working together makes a huge difference. Call Lynn Parkinson (661-252-2968) if you want to join us in our Garden Group. We meet periodically on a Saturday morning for an hour or so.

We have also had answer to prayer through several anonymous donations made by church members showing their enthusiasm and love for 1<sup>st</sup> Presbyterian Church. We thank and bless them more than we can express here. This is what draws me to our church- the outpouring of love and dedication.

Take a look around the church grounds. The plants are waking from their Winter Nap just now, so watch carefully for the Glory of Spring to come.

### **DAD'S MARINERS VISION**

My dad was a Merchant Marine and he taught all of us how to sail a boat. So I took that into account for my symbols. "Mariners Vision" was made for my dad, Richard Hawthorne, who was a Libra. There are four different constellations representing my mom Priscilla the Aquarius, My brother Dana and my sister Vicky the Sagittarians, plus my youngest sister Kim the Aries. All of these constellations and their stars are quilted into a corner. The stars themselves are quilted in glow-in-the-dark thread but the rest is quilted in gold tread. I, Pam, am the Gemini. As you look at this quilt you should look for the ghost ship also quilted in glow-in-the-dark thread. Around the captain's wheel are quilted flagmen spelling out "I love you". There is a Libra label on the back to represent my dad and I also used the glow-in-the-dark thread for the beam of the scales. I lovingly created this quilt and finished it May 30, 2002 at 11:55am. This quilt took around ten years of love and devotion to finish. It started out as lap sized and then Dad asked for a queen size. It turned out to be super king sized and touches the floor.
