#### PASTOR'S COLUMN, April 2017

(reprinted from April 2013)

As I write this column we are approaching Palm Sunday. Soon it will be Easter and our Lenten disciplines will be a thing of the past. (It always makes me even a bit more EXCITED about the celebration of Resurrection.) I will miss the daily reading from our Deacons devotional. I will miss the great Lenten Bible Studies. We have been thinking about "Spiritual Disciplines" during Lent, but Spiritual Disciplines are just as important after Lent.

When I was on staff at Forest Home, the camp hired a nature director named Gary Richmond, who had been a Zoo Keeper at the Los Angeles Zoo. I became good friends with his family, as I taught his two daughters to swim. He had amazing stories of animal life in the zoo. Eventually he published those stories in several books, the first titled A VIEW FROM THE ZOO. In it he told about how the birth of a giraffe gives insight to life's trials and hardships. When a calf is born, he falls ten feet and lands on his back. The mother then momentarily hovers over the newborn before kicking the baby head over heels. If the calf doesn't get up, he gets another good kick. This process is repeated to stimulate his efforts. Finally, when the little giraffe gets up on his wobbly legs, the mother kicks him off his feet again. To an outsider, such behavior seems cruel and unnecessary. To the mother, it is an expression of love. This first lesson in life helps the newborn to quickly develop the skills needed to move rapidly with the herd when predators are near. Sometimes we feel as though God has no sooner gotten us on our feet when He turns around and knocks us down. The next time that happens, think about the newborn giraffe. God may simply be strengthening you for your own protection in the future.

Spiritual disciplines are not only for special times such as Lent. Rather, they are practices we use to prepare us to become more who God wants us to become (and who He made us to be). Years ago, a young black child was growing up in Cleveland, in a home which he later described as "materially poor but spiritually rich." One day a famous athlete, Charlie Paddock, came to his school to speak to the students. At the time, Paddock was considered "The fastest human being alive." He told the children, "Listen! What do you want to be? You name it and then believe that God will help you be it." That little boy decided that he too wanted to be the fastest human being on earth. The boy went to his track coach and told him of his new dream. His coach told him, "It's great to have a dream, but to attain your dream you must build a ladder to it. Here is the ladder to your dreams: The first rung is determination! The second rung is dedication! The third rung is discipline! And the fourth rung is attitude!" The result of all that motivation is that he went on to win four gold medals in the Berlin Olympics. He broke the record in the 100-meter dash and the 200-meter. His broad jump record lasted for twenty-four years. His name? lesse Owens.

If we want to become something better, we too need discipline and training. A plant nursery had the following sign displayed, "The best time to plant a tree was 10 years ago. The next best time is today." Ten years of consistent devotion to spiritual disciplines would be ideal. If you haven't done that over the past decade, then the next best ideal is a commitment to start your spiritual development today.

My hope and prayer is that it becomes a joy to explore these possibilities. After all, the Bible tells us, "Keep yourself in training for a godly life. Physical exercise has some value in it, but spiritual exercise is valuable in every way, for it promises life both for now and for the future." I Timothy 4:7-8 /TEV



# GROWING OUR CHURCH

Hi, my name is Dorothy Ng. You may know me as the treasurer of this wonderful church. That is just one of the many hats I wear here. Another hat that I wear is being part of the Futures Committee, which is one of the more exciting things that I do, and if you work with numbers, you know what I mean... But I digress...

Okay, so what is the Futures Committee? This is a committee that Session created back a couple of years ago — when we had all of you write on those blue placemats at the congregational meeting — your ideas, suggestions, and visions for the church. We have been busy studying those placemats, praying that God leads the way, discussing our strengths, weaknesses, opportunities, and threats (that's fancy 'strategic planning' talk), and figuring out what our first step should be.

We believe the first step is to **grow** our church — build our attendance so that more people will join our church. There was a time when a church just opened its doors and people showed up. But those days are gone. It used to be that about the only things open on Sundays were church, a few restaurants offering Sunday Brunch, the bowling alley, and the movie theater. And all those places closed by early afternoon. Nowadays everything is open and all the youth sports have games and practices. It's crazy, and people just cannot seem to "fit" church into the equation. We have to go out into the community and invite our Santa Clarita neighbors to attend our church. I know, this sounds frightening to me, too. We just need to stand together. But we do need someone to lead us.

So here is what we have been thinking...We need a Community Ambassador. This person would be out in our town meeting people, getting involved in community life, and looking for opportunities for our church to serve. This person would become familiar with the church's surrounding community, help the committee create a strategy to build goodwill, strong relationships, and ministry opportunities. Some of these relationships could be with the city council, law enforcement and emergency services, schools, retailers, charities, other churches, and the Chamber of Commerce (which I have always thought we should join).

The question which should always be on the mind of this person — because it's on every single mind of each committee member — is, "What can we be doing in the community to make people *thankful* that we are here?"

I know God is calling at least one of you to do this. It may seem daunting, but the committee is here to help, support, encourage, and walk with you every single step of the way. We could even have more than one and divide up the tasks. This is an opportunity of a lifetime. Watch our church, and God's Kingdom, grow. # Celebrating a Savior for Broken Humanity By Jack Irwin, M.Div.

#### Good News for a Broken Humanity

Easter is good news, but why? Jesus came to bring the salvation of God to humanity, and, of course, that includes you and me. So what is the problem; why does humanity need saving? Just think of these current situations: \$\delta 13\$ million Syrians fleeing Syria or incarcerated in the civil war zone. \$\delta Young girls - 250 - kidnapped by the Boko Haram in northern Nigeria. \$\delta One billion people around the world who drink unclean water. \$\delta Homelessness and civilian violence and killing in America. \$\delta Brokenness, suffering, injustice, evil, mistreatment and abuse in our own lives. \$\delta People killed in wars and in other ways - estimated 260,000,000, in the 20th century alone, contradicting the optimism of science and governments. Humanity is in trouble. Death, sin, evil, and injustice reign and continue unabated. Where are harmony, peace, righteousness and justice? Who will rescue us from ourselves? We need a solution, but "all the kings' men have not put Humpty Dumpty together again."

Two thousand years ago, God sent someone to rescue humanity. A man appeared in Palestine, announcing that he had come to heal the brokenness of people and humanity. Jesus did that - healing the blind, the crippled, the shamed, the hungry, the possessed. He announced that he had come to bring healing to the people, the societies and the nations, to fulfill the promises of God to make the earth and all its people one peaceful, harmonious, righteous and just humanity.

#### Yet Our Savior was Broken by the World

Yet what did this one Jesus, a good and Godly man, experience? The prophet Isaiah predicted he would be a man who suffered like us, who was completely broken – "He was despised and rejected by men, a man of sorrows and familiar with suffering." (Isaiah 53:3) Broken physically, emotionally, spiritually, He even cried from the cross to God, "Why have you forsaken me?" (Matthew 27:46) He was executed by a broken and corrupt system of the Jewish state and the Roman Empire. Proven dead by the Romans, his dead body was given to his followers, wrapped and placed in a tomb by two secret followers, Nicodemus and Joseph of Arimathea. (Luke 23:50-54)

What good would a Savior be who just died on an ugly cross? He would only be worthless, except to confirm our opinions and fears that humankind is truly broken and has utterly no hope at all. But how could Jesus be the Savior of this broken mess of humanity unless he entered into its brokenness and confronted it. If the lifeguard is to rescue a drowning person, he does not stand on the shore, yelling to tell the swimmer he is drowning and how he can rescue himself. No, he dashes into the dangerous surf, to the risk of his own life, to do for the drowning person what he cannot do for himself. He grabs him and pulls him from the waters that seek to break him and pull him down. Jesus did just that for humanity, for you and for me.

## The Empty Tomb and Appearances - What Did These Mean?

After he had been certified dead to Pontius Pilate by the Roman soldiers, Jesus' dead body was buried in the tomb. But three days after his burial, the tomb where Jesus was buried was found empty. More importantly, after finding the empty tomb, the Gospels and letters tell us that his disciples saw an alive Jesus, who appeared to as many as 500 of them. (I Corinthians 15:1-8) He was alive in a real body of flesh and blood. "Impossible, a fantasy," some say. Let's look at the evidence.

Cont. from P. 6 But, "Oh," some say "He was not bodily raised. Maybe he was comatose on the cross and later resuscitated."

This was not so, the soldiers stuck a spear in his side to ascertain He was dead. (John 19:32-34)

- Others say, "The disciples stole the body and hid it somewhere, so that they could say that Jesus had been resurrected from death." But Pilate had ordered the stone at the tomb to be sealed and guards placed there. (Matthew 27:62-66)
- Others say, "Another body was substituted for Jesus on the cross." But, do not think that Roman justice would execute the wrong man. Do not think that his Mother Mary, weeping at the cross, was pretending the crucified one was her son. (John 19:25-27)
- Others claim, "These after-death sightings of Jesus were induced by strong, emotional memories and attachment to their teacher and mentor." Yet, the Scripture tells us the Jesus in his raised body met with them, ate with them, and showed them his wounded hands and side. (Matthew 28, Mark 16, Luke 24, John 20-21) His resurrection was bodily and not just a memory.
- Others say, The sightings of Jesus were a hallucination." Yet, psychologists tell us that apparitions and hallucinations do not appear to hundreds of people in all sorts of different locations at different times. Paul wrote that Jesus appeared to over 500 people. (I Corinthians 15:6)
- Jesus himself is reported as telling his disciples, "See, I am not a ghost. Look at the wounds in my hands and side." (Luke 24:36-39)
- Some say, "Jesus was raised in a spiritual body like that of angels. So Jesus 'cast off' his material body in death and was raised a spiritual body like angelic beings." Yet the evidence of Scripture is that his resurrection was in a flesh and blood body just as you and I have, not a "spiritual body" of angels.
- Others say, "The resurrection represented Jesus' attainment of perfect union with the Godhead, with the divine consciousness of the universe." This view discards any need for a bodily resurrection. This is not a Savior who rescues us; we are left on our own efforts to hopefully attain that too.
- Others might say, "Jesus was reincarnated." Reincarnation beliefs mean that after death, one's spirit goes to inhabit another, different body. But, Jesus' raised body was the self-same body of their earthly master Jesus.

None of these explanations do justice to the evidence presented by Scripture. The testimony of Christians as recorded in the Gospels is that Jesus was alive in his physical body. His resurrection was bodily. (Luke 24:37-40) He ate, he talked, and he touched. (Luke 24:41-43) There was no doubt in their minds that he had a real, physical body. (John 20:20) This testimony is echoed in all the great Creeds of Christendom.

Jesus bodily resurrection shows

He has actually defeated the great enemy Death.

He has defeated all the evil human and spiritual powers.

His vicarious sacrifice for humanity's sins was effective.

That God is faithful to his promise to rescue humanity.

That God is victorious in his plan to rescue humanity.

Without his bodily resurrection none of this would be true.

The bodily resurrection of Jesus shows us that God has the power to create a renewed Creation free from death, evil and corruption. We know that one day, when Jesus returns, God will renew all of Creation, including the bodily resurrection of all followers of Jesus, in transformed physical bodies like Jesus' resurrected body. We have a real Savior in Jesus because of his bodily resurrection. Without the bodily resurrection, we have no Savior.

Hallelujah, let us celebrate what a real Savior we have in Jesus!

#### HAPPY EASTER, AND OH HOW WE HAVE BEEN PLANNING! by Jim Parodi

A few months ago, Sonja Tweedie wrote an article about the workings of the church on a Sunday morning and how much happens, not to mention how many friends are needed for the service. It got me thinking about the prep work that goes into one Sunday Service, and how much time we work to prepare for that one service.

As examples, Pastor Bill spends over 20 hours per week preparing his sermons. Connie and the choir have been working for a few weeks practicing the beautiful anthems that we hear each week; let us not forget the hours she spends trying to find the right pieces that match Bill's messages. Lorraine and the Ringers spend 6-8 weeks planning and rehearsing to fill the Sanctuary with the beautiful bell tones we get to enjoy for that 4-minute piece. I myself work 3 to 4 weeks in advance rehearsing for the Prelude heard before the service and am usually planning 6 - 8 weeks in advance.

There are so many of our friends that spend hours, days, weeks to prepare the Church for just one Sunday's service, too numerous to mention in this short article. Stop and think about the devotion, not to mention time, these talented folks have. (I have not forgotten the Deacons, preparing communion, coffee, Ushers greeting and preparing the Sanctuary, Sam and the band with all their rehearsing, Nelson and his wife who spend hours on Saturday to keep the church looking great, Bob working all week for the church and preparing the program for Sunday's services; on and on the list goes.

How about the Holidays? I know I spend anywhere from 3 to 5 months looking for the right pieces. I know Connie and Lorraine also spend that much time planning for Christmas, Easter and all the other holidays. But when we find that piece, that's music!

Now let's take a moment and think about all the musicians in the traditional service and how great they sound (I do not count myself here, but the folks who are truly professionals), as they perform their pieces after weeks of planning. What happens when we put it all together? Suppose all our friends who attend the Easter service, find their perfect pew and take their seat as the organ plays for their entrance, then as the service begins, it all comes together. Imagine Lorraine and the Ringers, and Jeff at the piano, and myself at the organ all starting to play together. As we reach the culmination of the piece, you hear the beautiful tones of Connie and the Choir adding their voices to all that music.

Now that would be some planning and preparation!

Would that not be magical?? I think it would, do you?

Well, it is going to happen this Easter at both services — the organ plays a prelude, then the bells, piano, organ, and choir all join together in song as we prepare for the wonderful celebration to start.

Happy Easter everyone and may your plans and preparations come to pass.




Other programs coming up are:
