Pastor's Column

Easter comes early this year. So what's happening around here for Lent? In worship we are delving into the Gospel of Luke. In general all four Gospels tell the story of Jesus and His ministry and life here living among people. Jesus loved people and called them to more "abundant life." I heard a story about a preacher who said to a farmer. "Do you belong to the Christian family?" "No." said he, "they live two farms down." "No, no! I mean are you lost?" "No, I've been here thirty years." I mean are you ready for Judgment Day?" When is it?" "It could be today or tomorrow." "Well, when you find out for sure when it is, you let me know. My wife will probably want to go both days!" The gospels instruct us on how to follow Jesus' lead and live life well, sharing love and good will for all people.

Luke's Gospel offers a distinct look at Christ and His amazing compassion for all people. Luke tells us that he had had a chance to stand back from the extraordinary events that had been going on in this new movement of people called the "Way." Luke talked to the people involved in the leadership, read some earlier writings, and wrote his own version so that readers could know the truth about the things to do with Jesus. He was an educated and cultured man, the first real historian to write about Jesus. His book places Jesus not only at the heart of the Jewish world of the first century, but at the heart of the Roman world into which the Christian gospel exploded and which it was destined to change so radically. This exciting Gospel is the only Gospel with a sequel – the book of Acts (the only history of the early church found in the Canon of Scripture).

BUT WAIT! THERE'S MORE! (as they say on those late night infomercials) We're also trying something new this Lent. Lent is a time to do some new and different things which remind us of God's great ministry among us and help us keep Christ closer to us as we journey through the 40 days with Him. We are providing special dinners and a really fun program called, "Family Table Time" on Sunday nights from 5 to 6:30 in which we'll eat together, and explore in some very fun ways, the stories of Luke's Gospel. Our Adult Ministry is joining with our Children and Youth Ministries to plan very special nights for everyone. We want all ages to come and be a part of our church family preparing for Easter.

Let's all come back Sunday evenings for "Family Table Time."

LIVING WATERS MISSION TO GUATEMALA

From Dec. 13 to 20th Art Moore and I (Jack Irwin) traveled to Iglesia Bethania, Coatepeque, Guatemala with Living Water World Missions.

We installed a very sophisticated water filtration system with three filters and an ozone generator The purified water is stored in an adjacent tank. All this equipment and piping was assembled by our team together with men and boys of the church.

Living Water staff taught high school girls, women college students and mothers to, in turn, teach children about germs, how they are transmitted, the necessity of washing hands, the necessity of identifying pure water to use for cooking, teeth brushing, drinking and cleansing bablies. Education is a part of the Living Water program.

In summary, we were met with extreme friendship by the people of Iglesia Bethania. We spent a lot of time having lunch daily and talking with all of them in broken English on their part and broken Spanish on our part. We built bonds of love and joy between us and them, so that hugs and tears were shed when we said goodbye at the end of the dedication service.



TAKE LENT INTO THE COMMUNITY: PEACEMAKING IN OUR TIME by Cecil Ramnaraine

Iesus said in His Sermon on the Mount: "Blessed are the peacemakers, for they shall be called children of God," (Matthew 5:9)

January 19th was Martin Luther King Day, celebrating one of the great Christian peacemakers of our time.

Who doesn't realize that Peacemaking is something needed in our time! We as Christians can learn to be peacemakers and teach others to be peacemakers. I have written a curriculum that does just that. The curriculum has also been taught in adult education in churches, in teacher training in college, and in high schools in Minnesota. It is free. It is on-line. I want to suggest that we as Christians in the SCV can use this also in our community.

First, a little bit about myself. I am an old Presbyterian. I attended an elementary school run by The Canadian Presbyterian Mission in Guyana, South America. I was baptized there when I was in the fourth grade by Rev. James Dickson who was head of the mission. Then I enrolled in the Presbyterian high school. Upon graduation at fifteen, I began teaching in their elementary schools as a student teacher. In 1952 I was granted a partial scholarship to Macalester College in St. Paul, MN, a school sponsored by the Presbyterian Church. I have been a teacher.

The Peacemaking Curriculum: I have retired from teaching in Minnesota, and while teaching, I wrote a curriculum on peacemaking. On November 2, 2014, I signed up for the Adult Education Committee of our church. The committee has a great Lent program called Family Table. It co-ordinates with Pastor Bill's able leadership during Lent to study the passion, death and resurrection of Jesus, the Christ, our Lord. We can make our study of Lent count by taking the teaching of Jesus into the community. That is where He did His ministry. My peacemaking curriculum can be used to do this. It can be viewed on the internet at www.CecilRam.com or in the two paper copies in our church office.

The curriculum is based on the work of ten Christian peacemakers in our time. Examples are: Mother Teresa, who helped the poor, the helpless and the orphans: Martin Luther King who dealt with peace and racism and whose birthday is a national holiday (Ianuary 19): Eleanor Roosevelt who worked for human rights and equality; Nelson Mandela, who practiced forgiveness and reconciliation; Dag Hammarskjold's work for world peace in the U.N.; Franz Jaggerstalter who lived and died following the commandment "Thou shalt not kill," as a choice in war and peace; President Woodrow Wilson who proposed disarmament and the League of Nations; Dietrich Bonhoeffer who opposed Hitler and World War II; Albert Schweitzer, a Christian Missionary; and Will Rogers, a promoter of racial tolerance.

Using the Peacemaking Curriculum in the SCV: We can propose this curriculum to our children's and grandchildren's schools. As tax payers we can meet with the school teachers and principals and show them a free curriculum. We can encourage them to teach some or all of the above and by using our peacemakers we can continue the work of Jesus. Barbara Irwin conducted an Adult Education class on this curriculum at our church four years ago and has the material. In addition, we have a start in education ~ Rebecca Cranert will be teaching it at Monticello School in the fall of 2015.

These are noble starts to project the teachings of Jesus into our SCV community. If you are interested in the issues of peacemaking and justice, you can view the curriculum on-line or see the hard copy at the church office. Perhaps there are some of you who, like Becca, are in education and could use this material in your classes. If you do feel nudged by the Holy Spirit, please let Cecil or Barbara Irwin know of your interest.

Catechism Lesson: Ouestions and Answers to Instruct the Faithful- The Ten Commandments Given by God through Moses at Mt. Sinai after the Exodus of the Jews from Egypt (circa 1200 BC). These Commandments tell us how God expects us to live as a response to God's gracious saving acts toward the Iews and toward Gentiles, as well.

What is the Second Commandment? Answer: "You shall not make for yourself an idol." (Exodus 20:4 and Deuteronomy 5:8)

What do you learn from this commandment? Answer: "First, when I treat anything other than God as though it were God, I practice idolatry. Second, when I assume that my own interests are more important than anything else, I make them into idols, and in effect make an idol of myself." (see Deut. 6:14, I John 5:21, Exod. 34:14, I Chronicles 16:26, Romans 1:22-23, and Philippians 2:4)

From our Presbyterian Church USA "Study Catechism" approved by the General Assembly in 1998.

<u>Presbyterian Women</u>, as forgiven and freed by God in Jesus Christ and empowered by the Holy Spirit, commit ourselves: To nurture our faith through prayer and Bible study, to support the mission of the Church worldwide, to work for justice and peace, and to build an inclusive, caring community of women that strengthes the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) and witnesses to the promise of God's Kingdom.



A Love for Mission - - in Our Homes by Sonja Tweedie

Last month, our PW article concentrated on our theme: "A Love for Mission - - in Our Hearts." This month the focus is on "A Love for Mission in Our Homes." This is an interesting concept considering *mission* is generally thought to apply only to people or groups of people in other places - not in our homes. In fact, mission at home is as equally important if not more so. Our "home" can actually refer to at least three places: the house where we live, our country or a place where we feel "at home." In this case, "our home" is our place of residence where we eat, sleep and spend time with our family.

So, how can we show our love for mission in our homes? Several things come to mind: love, grace, kindness, consideration, a positive attitude and cooperation, to name a few. *Grace* is defined in Vine's Complete Expository Dictionary as "the friendly disposition from which the kindly act proceeds, graciousness, loving-kindness and goodwill." Also in Vine's, *Love* is defined as "agape, the characteristic word of Christianity. It is used in the NT to describe the attitude of God toward His Son and the human race, to convey His will to His

children concerning their attitude toward one another. Love can be known only by the actions it prompts. Love has its_perfect expression among people in the Lord Jesus Christ."

Our spouses and families are our most valued gifts, but it is easy to allow ourselves to get frustrated or upset when things do not go as we would like. Those are the times when we need to use love and grace in our words, thoughts and deeds. We can use grace and love as we debate an issue or as we attempt to show our children a way to make better choices. We must leave anger out of the equation by using words that do not harm or hurt, but show love and forgiveness. We have learned how to treat others from the example of Christ. We just have to stop and think before we act in anger.

Mission in our homes simply means to treat others we love, as well as ourselves, with grace, love and forgiveness. Let those words be our mission as we live in loving fellowship with Christ in our homes - - the perfect place to show the virtues of mission.



Contemporary Christian music is a genre of modern music focused on the Christian faith. It began as those affected by the 1960s Jesus movement revival began to express themselves in a more contemporary style of music than hymns and gospel music.

Though there were Christian albums in the 1960s that contained contemporary-sounding songs, there were two albums recorded in 1969 that are considered to be the first complete albums of Contemporary Christian music one of which is Pastor Barnes' favorite: Upon This Rock by Larry Norman.

The music has certain themes and messages behind the songs and lyrics including praise and worship, faith, encouragement, and prayer. The songs also focus on themes of devotion, inspiration, redemption, reconciliation, and renewal.

Contemporary Christian music has influences from folk, gospel, pop and rock music. Genres of music such as soft rock, folk rock, alternative, hip-hop, etc. have played a large influence on CCM.

Lyrically, informal, sometimes intimate, language of relationship is often used. The terms 'You' and 'I' are often used rather than 'God' and 'we', and lyrics such as, 'I, I'm desperate for You' and 'Hungry I come to You for I know You satisfy, I am empty but I know Your love does not run dry' exemplify the similarity of the lyrics of some Contemporary Christian music to popular love songs.

Contemporary Christian music is a powerful blend of scripture or scripture-based messages, physical involvement in the act of singing, and readily memorized phrases and ideas in the form of choruses and bits of melody. It is not just singing a song; it is worshiping God, learning about God, and being encouraged by God through the Holy Spirit. The music is a gateway experience that opens our hearts to enthusiastically worship with our congregation (and then hum a favorite line from a song throughout the day).
