





DID YOU KNOW??? HAPPY CENTENIAL BIRTHDAY TO OUR ORGAN!!!!! By Jim Parodi

Did you know that our organ in the Sanctuary is 100 years old this year??

Let me introduce you to the M.P.Moller Opus 2022 organ. Originally built and installed in the Strand Theater in Meridian, Mississippi back in 1915 to accompany the Vaudeville acts and the silent movies of the time. It was originally what we call a II\22 Theater Organ (II is organ talk for manuals\keyboards, and 22, the amount of ranks (each rank is one voice with approx. 64 pipes). It was played by an organist named Kathleen Murphy (which at that time was highly unusual).

As far as we can ascertain, sometime in the early 20's, William S. Hart was doing a publicity tour for a film, when he visited/appeared at the Strand Theater in Meridian. He found that the theater was in the process of replacing the Moller organ with a new Robert Morgan Organ. He was able to purchase the Moller for a song (looks like approx. \$12,000) and had his people make arrangements to have the organ transported to his home town, Newhall, CA where his wife was involved with the local community church, and arranged for it to be donated to the church.

In those days, heavy loads were transported via rail and horse drawn cargo carts. Interesting side note about the transportation: once in CA, the organ was placed on 6 to 8 horse drawn carts. While being transported, 2 of the carts tipped and a few ranks of pipe were damaged beyond repair.

History is a little vague once the organ arrived at the church. I have heard that it was installed in the previous church building immediately after arriving. Other info I heard is that it was not installed until the 50's. (if anyone can verify, correct or add to this,

please let me know).*

Either way, due to space limitation, the organ (already reduced by a few ranks), was further reduced to approximately II\16. The ranks not used were the voices that made the organ a Theater console (specifically the Tibia voices).

Once the old church building was too badly damaged by the earthquake in the 70's, the organ was removed and installed in the current building in 1980. Though again due to space limitation, the organ was further reduced to the current II\8, using the 1961 William Reisner console.

The organ today is mostly operational, due to in no small part to the dedication of church member Jerre Crosier, but the years are catching up. The console is wearing out with many minor problems, as well as being quite outdated without hope of repair. The wonderful sounding Chimes do not always work. The organ is about due for its 35yr maintenance in the wind chests (replacing leathers, the blower, and the console and revoicing the pipes). Unfortunately, the costs for updating are quite high (around \$25K). Let's pray that the organ can continue to bless us for many years to come.

We should all be very proud of this rare old gem. There are not too many 100yr old organs anywhere, and certainly not in the Santa Clarita Valley. Each time you have the opportunity to hear the organ, take a moment, pause, listen, and consider the sound you hear was originally heard 100 years ago. (First performance was Sept 15, 1915).

To celebrate the organ's centennial (which is very rare for pipe organs in the United States), we are planning a celebration and concert on Sept 20 in the afternoon. (Stay tuned as plans are finalized.)

On a personal note, I have been blessed with the great opportunity to experience and play many organs, small/large, pipe/electronic. None have been 100yrs old. It is truly a unique and powerful experience. I am quite blessed and honored to play the Moller Opus 2022, and look forward each Sunday to the experience of hearing it speak. Thank You.

^{*}Editor's note: Previous church building was built about 1923, so organ could have been installed as early as then.

I like Paul McCartney 'cause he was once a beetle.


I like Paul Getty 'cause he had lots of money and lived so lavishly.

But none of these Pauls are the two Pauls I'm talking about. No siree! I'm talkin 'bout my two good friends, Paul Aijian and Paul (actually I don't know his last name but it was something like "Theapostle"). Perhaps I stretched it a little with the former Saul of Tarsus but definitely not with Paul of Santa Clarita—he was a really good friend of mine. So, here's just a few of the things I learned from each of them:

ON CHILDREN

THE APOSTLE: And you, fathers, do not provoke your children to wrath, but bring them up in the training and admonition of the Lord.

THE PASTOR: We cannot grow up loving unless we have love poured all over us and we are a washed in love—even from the womb.... We think our children are our own, but they're not. They belong to God. He just uses us.... We need to sit our children down and tell them about the infinite possibilities God has inside of them.... If you live long enough you get to bask in the reputation of your children.

ON FAITH

THE APOSTLE: Therefore having been justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom also we have obtained our introduction by faith into this grace in which we stand; and we exult in hope of the glory of God.

THE PASTOR: Faith (ideas in our heads) is not about doctrine. Faith is what we do-faithing. Faith is about connections, connections with other people.

ON GOD'S LOVE

THE APOSTLE: And now these three remain: faith, hope and love. But the greatest of these is love.

THE PASTOR: God loves you so much that, if you give it half a chance and get yourself out of the way, man, you will have wings to take you off the planet.
