At Presby-the-Bestie, God's home!







Spotlight on Stewardship

We are blessed to be Presbyterians for lots of reasons!!! One big one is that our congregation at First Pres Newhall is truly OURS! We choose Elders and Deacons who are regular people, just like us, to lead us. The Session of Elders has 13 Session committees which oversee the activities and ministries through which our church serves God.

Jesus taught us that the church is the "body" and each member is necessary to complete the whole "body" in the way that God intended. And the way our committees fulfill God's purpose is to invite all of us to play an active role in our family of faith through participating in these committees and their activities.

Each month this year we are spotlighting one of the Session committees. It has been enlightening and fun to learn about each one...who the members are, what they do, and the difference they make for our congregation's work for God's Kingdom.

This month the Spotlight is on our Stewardship Committee, which has the incredible responsibility of making sure that all of the other committees have the funds to do their work!!!! So every time we have heard of the wonderful work of our many committees, the Stewardship Committee is expected to keep them on track financially to make their work possible. We are humbled and awed by the job we are committed to doing.

Our Elders on Stewardship are Jim Linn and Laurie Swingle. They are joined by Cam Stewart; Tim Pulliam; Linda Lynch; Dorothy Ng, our treasurer, and Pastor Bill.

Our member's length of service ranges from 25 years of service to having joined within the last two years. That gives us both historical continuity and fresh perspective.

Here is Our Stewardship Mission Statement in a nutshell:

Our Stewardship Committee strives to help our church family transform our hearts to reflect the image of Christ...... by becoming

STEWARDSHIP DISCIPLES...who

Give all of our gifts of time, money, and talent, as generously to God as Christ gives His gifts to us.

Participate in fully staffing and funding our church to support the work of God's Kingdom throughout our community, country and world.

Facilitate a program that strengthens Newhall First Pres to continue its service to God far into the future.



The Stewardship Committee will strive to build stewardship disciples of our church family by: transforming the hearts of believers to reflect the image of Christ, to become generous "as Christ is generous in being rich toward God" in the stewardship of all our gifts; to empower God's Kingdom work to be fully staffed, funded and shared throughout our community, country and world; and, as a committee, to monitor the fiscal responsibilities of our church ministry.



Our Stewardship Committee is responsible to lead this effort by:

- Faithfully monitoring the fiscal responsibilities of our church.
- Completing an annual campaign to receive pledges to fund the church's yearly budget.
- Educating and encouraging members to give their tithes and pledges without interruption by using their Bank Bill Pay program or Parish Pay through the church office.
- Providing the format for Session committees to calculate and organize their annual budget requests.
- Coordinating, for the final approval of Session, the annual church budget to fit the projected income.
- Providing monthly oversight of the financial statements.
- Updating the congregation regularly on how we are meeting our budget and any need for intervention.
- Providing, with outside counsel, an annual audit of the financial statements for the approval of Session.
- Providing a program to ensure that First Pres Newhall is able to continue funding our church in the future.

The **Future Fund Program** is now available to enable planned gifts from members to support the church in the future. The purpose of the Future Fund is to expand and enrich the mission of the congregation, not to support the annual operating budget. Unless a donor specifies otherwise, all principal amounts will be retained and only the income expended.

These gifts will usually not come from regular monthly income, but rather from assets, estate proceeds and other planned gifts, such as:

- Wills and bequests
- Gifts of appreciated stock
- Gifts of Life Insurance
- Creation of a Charitable Trust

Future Fund gifts are always tailored to fit the circumstances and desires of the donor and therefore are handled on an individual basis. A private confidential appointment can provide a family with various options that will not only enable a gift to the church, but may also offer significant tax advantages and/or sources of income.

Here is a question I want you to answer honestly. Think about it for a few moments before you answer. What is the secret to a Christian life? In other words, what is it that makes our lives different from people who are not Christians? Here's the simple answer: believing the promises of God. And what is faith? It is taking God at His word. Dr. D. James Kennedy in his book, <u>Freedom From Financial Fear</u>, in chapter two entitled "Fully Persuaded," writes the following: "If we are to see God's abundance in our lives, if we are to be used in a great way by God in this world, it is going to be on the basis of our faith in the promises of God."

Abraham believed fully in God's promises. Even though he and Sarah were old and childless, he trusted God that his descendants would be as numerous as the stars in heaven. As it is written in Romans 4:20-21, "Yet he (Abraham) did not waver through unbelief regarding the promise of God, but was strengthened in his faith and gave glory to God, being fully persuaded that God had power to do what he had promised."

Are you fully persuaded that what God has promised, He is able to perform? Don't be of feeble faith which is an affront to God. God can do all things. He is the God of all truth. Place your faith fully, confidently, and totally in God.

Cont. from p. 8 I know you're saying, "Of course, I believe I'm totally faithful to God. I'm a Christian, after all." But how faithful are you when the offering plate is passed at church or when the pledge card arrives in the mail? Doesn't your faith waver a little bit and you don't give as much as you should? But listen to the promises of God.

"And my God will meet all your needs according to the riches of his glory in Christ Jesus." (Philippians 4:19)

"'For I know the plans I have for you,' declares the Lord, 'plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future.'" (Jeremiah 29:11)

Need more evidence? How about Malachi 3:10 or Mark 10:29-30? Let's just summarize it by saying that stewardship and the fulfillment of God's promises are not a matter of finances but of faith.

"Faith is a gift from God; it is also an act of man," Dr. Kennedy states. "God gives it, and we exercise it. It is through the Holy Spirit that faith comes. Therefore, we pray for faith."

Let us all pray to God to be people of strong faith, fully persuaded that God is able to do that which He has promised. And after praying, we should step out in faith and believe God. He will keep His promises. Trust Him fully.

DOING THEOLOGY IN THE 21ST CENTURY: VISITING WITH BISHOP (RET.) N. TED WRIGHT, ESTEEMED NEW TESTAMENT SCHOLAR

On May 1-3, 2014, we (Art Moore, Carol Cogley, John Favalessa, Judy Carter, Jack Irwin, Tim Knox and John's friend Rev. David Ratcliff) gathered at Fuller Theological Seminary in Pasadena with 2000 others to hear a wonderful, engaging, and educational series of lectures by Prof. N. Ted Wright. Since 2010, Wright has been Research Professor of New Testament and Early Christianity at St. Andrews University in Edinburgh, Scotland. He is a retired Anglican Bishop in England and previously taught at Oxford and McGill (Toronto).

Wright is one of the leading scholars on the New Testament and early Christianity and has written with his pastoral heart for the church laity. He is a prolific author of both academic works and books for the laity of the Church. Judy is reading "Simply Christian." Jack taught "How God Became King" in Life Academy and is reading Wright's "The Climax of the Covenant." Roland is reading Wright's just published academic tome, "Paul and the Faithfulness of God."

Wright wants the Western Christian Church to return to right Biblical thinking. Here are some of Wright's correctives for Western Christianity.

Heaven is where God is. It is not a geographical or cosmic location. The church has overemphasized heaven as a "place" we go when we die. Some Biblical images describe heaven as "up there," and our culture locates heaven as a separate place somewhere in the cosmos. Wright says the basic Biblical concept is that heaven is wherever God is present. Heaven is like a "sixth dimension" all around us. See Colossians 1:16 "... in him [Christ] all things hold together," which emphasizes God's presence throughout his creation.

The Gospel of Christianity is more than personal salvation. It is about God's plan to redeem you and me, the earth, and the cosmos, all of Creation from its death spiral. The Western Church has generally preached a truncated Gospel as "death insurance," preaching that accepting by faith that Jesus died for your sins gains you entrance into heaven (God's presence) when you die. For Wright the Gospel is much more than that. It is God's plan to redeem all of creation – humanity, the earth, the cosmos – to return it all to God's sovereign reign. See Genesis 1-11 (see the movie NOAH) where sin, evil and death entered into the Lord's Creation and consumes the human race. See Revelation 21 and 22 where God's redemptive plan to rid His creation of evil, death, corruption and sin is consummated.

The earth will be redeemed and become the place for eternal life. It is not a corrupted globe to be disposed after we escape to heaven. The Western Church has overemphasized going to heaven and generally regarded the earth as a corrupt place we will leave behind forever. Wright says, God's redemptive plan is to redeem the earth where heaven will be united with earth and bodily eternal life will be lived. See Revelation 22 where heaven (God's presence) comes to earth. God shall dwell among all the peoples of the earth. This fulfills Psalm 72:19b "...may the whole earth be filled with His glory."

The Biblical answer to death is the resurrection of the body, not the Platonic idea of the soul leaving the body and escaping to "heaven." Caught up in the idea of heaven as a place to escape to, the Church has de-emphasized the bodily resurrection of all believers. If you say the Apostles Creed, you are reminded that we believe in the "resurrection of the body and the life everlasting." Our bodies will be raised from death to be like Jesus' resurrection body, free of sin, corruption, and death. Bodily existence is lived in one place: Earth. While Paul wrote in his letters that when we die we are with the Lord, he does not explain it as the transmigration of the "soul" to heaven. Wright says the basic Biblical answer to death is a time of waiting for the bodily resurrection, the hope of glory promised. The Presbyterian memorial service for the dead is titled, "A Witness to the Resurrection," meaning the eventual bodily resurrection of the believer from death when Jesus returns.

The Story of the Gospel is told in the whole Bible, from Genesis right through to Revelation. The church has deemphasized the "Old Testament" and forgotten that God's plan for redemption started back with Adam and Eve and with Abraham. Some Christians think the "New Testament" replaced the "Old Testament." As Wright shows, you cannot understand Jesus Christ or God's plan revealed in the New Testament without understanding the plan that started in the Old Testament. The



Lord promised Eve that, while the Serpent (Evil) will strike at the heel of her seed, her seed will strike the serpent's head, killing it. (Gen. 3:15) This promise is fulfilled by Jesus Christ. God's plan of redemption continued with the Lord's covenant with Abraham, through whom God would save not just Abraham's people, the Jews, but all nations, tribes and peoples of the earth. (Gen. 12:1-3)

We live in the "in-between" time, between Jesus' first advent and his final advent, when He comes as Lord of lords, and King of kings. (Rev. 19:16) We have something to do as Christians during this time – to work to spread the Kingdom of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. The Western Church has de-emphasized this purpose for our lives, in emphasizing "personal salvation" in which believers just wait around to die and go to heaven. Jesus Himself commanded his disciples to "go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always to the very end of the age," when He comes again. (Matthew 28:19-20) Obeying Jesus means telling people about the love of God in Jesus Christ and also acting in word and deed as people of God's Kingdom, who are under God's reign. This is true religion - not just attending church, but acting justly and working for justice, loving mercy and expressing mercy, as well as walking humbly with the Lord, our Heavenly Father. (Micah 6:8) Wright told us that primary ministries of the Christian Church to the world are to pray for the world and to identify with, standby and help those in the world who are suffering and in pain. By this, the Church lives and acts as a witness of Jesus Christ and the Lord's plan of redemption.

These are a few major highlights of the Biblical insights Wright has made through his academic and pastoral ministries. As you can sense, Wright's first love is the Church of Jesus Christ and he encourages the Church to be true to its foundation and to its calling as the People of God. His writings are very relevant for the Western Church in the 21st Century. They give us all food for serious thought and reflection on how we as individual believers and as a congregation live our lives as Christians. If you want to join in the discovery, just ask any of us who went to this convocation for one of Wright's books to read.



Pentecost Banner

The Pentecost is found in the book of Acts and marks the anointing of the Apostles by the Holy Spirit, and is noted as the anniversary of the creation of the Christian church.



Dove: the primary symbol of the Holy Spirit, reflecting that the Holy Spirit was represented by a dove at the time of the baptism of Christ. Hence the water drop that the dove is in.

Fire: represents the presence of God in His glory. Also, it symbolizes the presence of God in the Spirit (Acts 2:3).

Wind: the Spirit which blows as needed according to God's plan.

Wheat: the symbol for the Bread of Life, being the fundamental ingredient in bread. Bread is a symbol of God's provision of life, just as He continues to provide for the church even after Jesus's ascension by sending the Holy Spirit to live in our midst.

Hearts: 50 of them represent the days between Easter and Pentecost. The heart is a symbol of love and devotion. According to Scripture, the heart is the inner person, the moral and spiritual center. God engages our heart, mind and spirit in relationship with Him.
