

What is the Church? By Pastor Bill Barnes

Well, that is a complex question. In one sense it is the Bride of Christ. (That's what He calls it.) Jesus said to them, "You cannot make wedding guests fast while the bridegroom is with them, can you? The days will come when the bridegroom will be taken away from them, and then they will fast in those days." Luke 5:34-35

For some the Church is their own place of worship. In our church where people have been sitting in the same pew for years, the following is apropos: The old retiring usher was giving instruction to his young, inexperienced replacement: "And remember, my boy, that we have nothing but good kind Christians in this church until you try to put someone else in their pew." Then there was the one about the delinquent church member who suddenly began attending church faithfully on Sunday mornings. The pastor was greatly pleased and told him: "How wonderful it makes me feel to see you at services with your wife!" Well, Parson, "said the prodigal, "It's a matter of choice. I'd rather hear your sermon than hers."

It may be helpful to remember the words of Karl Barth: The life of the one holy Universal Church is determined by the fact that it is the fulfillment of the service as ambassador enjoined upon it. Where the life of the Church is exhausted in self-serving, it smacks of death; the decisive thing has been forgotten, that this whole life is lived only in the exercise of what we called the Church's service as ambassador, proclamation, kerygma. A Church that recognizes its commission will neither desire nor be able to petrify in any of its functions, to be the Church for its own sake. There is the "Christ-believing group," but this group is sent out: "Go and preach the Gospel!" It does not say, "Go and celebrate services!" "Go and edify yourselves with the sermon!" "Go and celebrate the Sacraments!" "Go and present yourselves in a liturgy, which perhaps repeats the heavenly liturgy!""Go and devise a theology which may gloriously unfold like the Summa of St. Thomas!" Of course, there is nothing to forbid all this; there may exist very good cause to do it all; but nothing, nothing at all for its own sake! In it all the one thing must prevail: "Proclaim the Gospel to every creature!" The Church runs like a herald to deliver the message. It is not a snail that carries its little house on its back and is so well off in it, that only now and then it sticks out its feelers, and then thinks that the "claim of publicity" has been satisfied. No, the Church lives by its commission as herald, it is "la compagnie de Dieu." Where the Church is living, it must ask itself whether it is serving this commission or whether it is a purpose in itself. If the second is the case, then as a rule it begins to smack of the "sacred," to affect piety, to play the priest and to mumble. Anyone with a keen nose will smell it and find it dreadful! Christianity is not "sacred," rather there breathes in it the fresh air of the Spirit. Otherwise it is not Christianity. For it is an out-and-out "worldly" thing open to all humanity: "Go into all the wor

AMOR THIRD TIME... by James Allison



What do you see when you picture the city of Tijuana in the beautiful country of Mexico? Do you smell the pungent scent of burning trash, or do you smell the sweet scent of tortillas being made in the afternoon? Do you picture the children suffering with what they

do not have, or do you see hope within their eyes? What do you hear? Is it blaring music with language you can't understand, or do you hear the sound of commerce and a booming city? Are the roads full of bumps and potholes, or is the road a challenge to be conquered? When I go to Mexico, I see all of these things and they each represent life in all its beauty. When I think of Mexico, I think of opportunity, not only for building a home for a deserving family and modeling Christ's behavior, but an opportunity for the people of Mexico to know that there is a God, and God has people, willing to help. The message I see for us, is of a people willing to give hope to the hopeless, to





abandon our security, and to have sore hands so that others may prosper after us.


When I first went on the Amor trip in April 2014, I thought, "Wow, I can't believe we are actually building a house...with this crew?!" Of course I am joking about the comment "with this crew." (We have a great sense of humor!) However, sometimes we even impress ourselves with how much work we can accomplish with our limited amount of time and our limited numbers. On my first trip we had fourteen people, on my second we had eighteen and on both trips we were able to get very far in completing the home. I was looking forward to doing that again, but this time I was worried. I was worried because we only had eight going with us to Mexico. This is a house we are talking about, not a room extension, or painting a church, we are building a house with eight people. Can it be done?

Meeting the family that we are building for has a unique anticipation.

Typically, in the van, we all discuss who the family members are, their occupations and what is currently happening with the family.

When we get to the job site, sometimes the family interacts with us, sometimes they don't, but we eagerly look forward to meeting the family regardless of how much time we get with them. This time, we had a wonderful family of four with one on the way, they were with us the whole time we were working. They helped in gathering materials and hammering nails. They communicated with us, and even made bean burritos for us. The taste of those burritos invigorated our senses and they were a great treat while we were working. This family couldn't have shown us more hospitality, and we were grateful for it.

Our next scheduled trip will be in October, I will be there because I wouldn't want to miss this opportunity, and I hope more of our congregation comes out to discover exactly why this twice-yearly trip to Mexico has lasted for over a decade at our church. To see the beauty that is beneath the burning trash and pot holes. To preach the gospel through our working hands. To be the agents of evangelism. We almost completed the home; only had stucco to go!





Dr. James Kennedy discusses in his book, <u>Freedom from Financial Fear</u>, how our nation has for the most part become "spiritually illiterate." He states that we live in a nation "where every effort has been made to remove the Bible not only from the schools, but from the minds of people" we don't understand the larger principles of stewardship where tithing is the primary importance but only a part of the larger picture of Christian stewardship. He says there are 5 principles that few people understand about Biblical stewardship and we need to apply them today.

Principle #1— "The earth is the Lord's, and all its fullness" (1 Corinthians 10:26). God is the Creator. He created all things: galaxies, stars, planets, plants, animals, and even us. You name it, God created it. He made it and He owns it. He possesses it, it belongs to Him. WE belong to Him because He made us. WE need to acknowledge that nothing is ultimately our own. WE have received everything we have as a stewardship FROM God.

A steward, in case you don't know by now, is someone who deals with, occupies, and handles the property of another. That person has to give an account to the owner of how he/she dealt with it. Remember, there is nothing we can give to God that is our own. He has given us all we have. We are just returning to God what was His in the first place.

Principle #2 – God wants us, not ours. "They first gave themselves to the Lord, and then to us by the will of God" (2 Corinthians 8:5). God is more interested in us than in the things we may possess. God created us in His image. Therefore, we must first give ourselves to God. Otherwise whatever we give to God is from an unclean heart and mind whose motives are principally selfish. Our gifts won't be accepted by God. It's only after He accepts us that He can and will accept what we give Him.

Principle #3 – "First Fruits" – God said our first fruits belong to Him. That means we demonstrate our acknowledgement that earth is the Lord's and its fullness is His by returning to God what He requires. We were not given the middle fruit, the last fruit, or even the fruit that fell to the ground. We were given God's first fruit and we must return it to Him. Start in faith by giving to Him the first fruits. The first fruits are described in the Bible as tithes and offerings. The tithe is one tenth and the offering is anything over that tenth. Anything less is robbing from God as stated in Malachi 3.

Principle #4 – The tithe is a test. It is a test of the reality of faith. Jesus talked more about possessions and money then he did about heaven and hell. That's how important it is to him and we, being humans, have to hear something several times before it sticks in our heads. Even then sometimes we just don't get it. Anyway, the handling of possessions is a visible, tangible representation of a reality of faith. Whatever you trust in is your god. Who and/or what is your god? Is it the true God or gold, money, or mammon? "You cannot serve God and mammon" (Mark 6:24). Whatever we trust in for our well-being is our god.

Dr. Kennedy states that every Sunday is a test of the tithe given. "People stand and sing and profess their faith and recite their belief, but do they tithe?" It doesn't matter what we say with our lips, the reality of faith and trust in God is made plain every time the plate is passed. And it's not a letter grade we get on this test. It's a "pass or fail."

Principle #5 - Wonderful blessings await us. What do we receive if we pass the test of the tithe? We receive God's promise that wonderful blessings will be ours. "I will open the windows of heaven and pour out for you such blessing that there will not be room enough to receive it" (Malachi 3:10)

What could be better than that - a life full of God's wonderful blessings.

Presbyterian Women, as forgiven and freed by God in Jesus Christ and empowered by the Holy Spirit, commit ourselves: To nurture our faith through prayer and Bible study, to support the mission of the Church worldwide, to work for justice and peace, and to build an inclusive, caring community of women that strengthes the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) and witnesses to the promise of God's Kingdom.





How to Read the Bible, PART II: More on the Biblical Genres,

Idioms and Rhetorical Devices Used In the Bible by Roland Wrinkle

In Part I, I opened with this point: HERE'S THE KEY: Look For the Intended Meaning—We All Know What the Words (Translated From Ancient Languages by Others) *SAY*, But What Do They *MEAN*? I tried to explain why, in order to understand any particular passage in scripture, we first need to appreciate the genre of literature, rhetorical device or idiom being used. To read all of scripture literally, while ignoring the genre or rhetorical device, will lead to missing the author's intent, i.e. what he was trying to say. I went over the use of idioms, hyperbole and narratives. Now, on to some more examples (I have relied at times on GotQuestions.org, a terrific resource.)

Discourse: This genre is where people are speaking. It can be a sermon, a prayer, or any other long speech. The book of Job has a lot of this, but there are also examples in the Gospels, such as the Sermon on the Mount, and in the book of Acts. In fact, I believe that there are nine sermons by Peter and Paul in Acts that tell us exactly what the gospel is and is not. Determine the main point of whatever the person is saying. Take things literally, but don't believe everything that people say. In the book of Job, there are a lot of things said that are simply not true. If you know who is speaking you can determine if what they are saying is true or not.

Poetry: Poetry is the genre of Psalms. It is full of symbolic language and is full of emotion. Look for repetition. In ancient times, repetition was used for emphasis, so pay attention to the things that are said more than once. Look for parallelism. Sometimes (especially in Proverbs) an idea will be stated and then restated either as its opposite or from a different perspective. The two ideas are basically saying the same thing. Don't take the figurative parts literally. Look for the comparisons being made by the figures of speech. Many scholars believe Job to be the greatest poem in the entire Bible. From *The Great Poems of the Bible* by James Kugel (Simon and Schuster, 1999):

"From the Psalms to the Prophets, from Job to Ecclesiastes, much of the Bible is written in poetry. The poems of the Bible include some of its best known and most beloved passages: "The Lord is my Shepherd," "Let justice roll down like water," "By the rivers of Babylon," "Remember your Creator," "Arise, shine, for thy light is come!" These poems live in the hearts of those who are familiar with the Bible and offer rich rewards to anyone who is approaching the world's greatest book for the first time. . . . Taken together, these poems represent the very essence of the Hebrew Bible. Reading them one after another is like taking a guided tour through Scripture, meeting firsthand some of its most important teachings and opening the way to an understanding of the Bible as a whole." Law: This includes the books of Leviticus and Deuteronomy. The purpose of law is to express God's sovereign will concerning government, priestly duties, social responsibilities, etc. Knowledge of Hebrew manners and customs of the time, as well as a knowledge of the covenants, will complement a reading of this material. One of the principle purposes of the law is to teach us what sin is (What shall we say, then? Is the law sinful? Certainly not! Nevertheless, I would not have known what sin was had it not been for the law. Rom 7:7) and how we can never get in a right relationship with God by following the law because it serves to convict us. Enter the perfect Israelite, Jesus of Nazareth, who gathered all unwitting evil together and had them thinking they could destroy the Son of God but, instead, He nailed them all to the cross for all time. The law served a pedagogical purpose and we will never understand the Old Testament unless we understand that.

History: Stories and epics from the Bible are included in this genre. Almost every book in the Bible contains some history, but Genesis, Exodus, Numbers, Joshua, Judges, 1 and 2 Samuel, 1 and 2 Kings, 1 and 2 Chronicles, Ezra, Nehemiah, and Acts are predominately history. Knowledge of secular history is crucial, as it dovetails perfectly with biblical history and makes interpretation much more robust.

Anthropology: This is the study or science of humankind and the Bible is just loaded with it. Genesis, Joshua, Judges, 1 and 2 Samuel, 1 and 2 Kings and the passion narratives of Matthew, Mark and Luke are great studies in anthropology. They are, for sure, brimming with cruelty, massacres, wars and atrocities, but not because this was how God made us, but because we rebelled against God and His plan for Creation. These are "merely" stories about fallen and broken human nature. It all sets the stage for the eventual unfolding of God's grand plan to restore us and all of Creation to the way things were supposed to be in the first place. The Bible is a text book on human anthropology.

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Prophecy: A process in which one or more messages communicated to a prophet are then communicated to others. Such messages typically involve divine inspiration, interpretation, or revelation of events to come. These books are easy to recognize: Isaiah, Jeremiah, Micah, Amos, etc. There are also prophecies in the Gospels, the Epistles and Revelation. When you come across a prophecy, see who it was given to originally (Israel, Judah, everyone). Interpret it first in light of the original hearers of the prophecy. Look to see if the prophecy has already been fulfilled. The Gospel of Matthew is one big exercise in explaining to the Jews (and to us) how, in considerable detail, the entire story of Israel is fulfilled by the story of Jesus. Indeed, this is the heart of what we call the Gospel of Jesus.

Apocalypse: This is the genre of revelation. It is something big revealed to someone. This is similar to prophecy although in an apocalypse the events being described are of a large scale. This genre can be found in the book of Revelation and also parts of Daniel, especially chapter 7. This is that part of the Bible where God tells us how everything turns out in the end, i.e. the Christian hope for the "new heaven and new earth," promised in Isaiah 65:17, preached by Peter in 2 Peter 3:13, set as the cornerstone of Christianity in 1 Corinthians 15:35-38 and vivified and glorified in Revelation 21 as the culmination of history, when heaven comes down to and merges with earth, when the Creator's project—begun in Genesis 1 and 2 and grotesquely distorted in Genesis 3 when humans, formed and designed to reflect the image of God, rebelled—is finally fulfilled. This is the Good News. This is the Gospel.

You want to know about allegories, parables, similes, exhortation, wisdom literature, household codes, covenants, myths, aphorisms, dialectics and metaphors? Come stop by the benches outside the church before service. I'll give you a biscuit.
