#### Pastor Column March 2015

We are in the midst of Lent as I write this article. I am loving reading the Deacons Lenten Devotional that so many of you have participated in preparing. I am also excited about our explorations in the Gospel of Luke during worship and the wonderful Family Lenten Table Times on Sunday evenings at 5pm. And I look forward once again to celebrating Easter; early this year on April 5<sup>th</sup>.

It has been a difficult financial year, but our outgoing Session has prayerfully and painfully created a wise and prudent budget for us as we move forward. We will celebrate our outgoing officers on **Sunday March 15<sup>th</sup> as we share in one combined worship service at 10AM and then meet for brunch and our Annual Congregational meeting in Fellowship Hall.** 

In addition we have just installed our new Deacons and Elders to their church assignments. And they are a wonderful group of Leaders. I remember an old story when a new incoming board of deacons was being briefed on techniques for making church calls. One newly elected member was obviously timid about her responsibilities. The pastor hoped to encourage her by stressing the power of prayer. "You'll find it helpful, before you make the call, to spend a few moments talking to God about it," he said. When the deacons met later to report, the timid one waylaid the pastor and said enthusiastically, "Oh, thank you for what you said about prayer. I tried it when I went out on my call, and it works." "I'm glad to hear that," beamed the pastor. "Tell us what happened."

This does not reflect our Deacons or Elders, as they lead and minster to us so well. But it does remind us that they do so much and pray for us as their church family. Sometimes we get excited about an idea or an event and in our enthusiasm we can't understand anyone else's disappointment or opposition to an idea or event. Just like families, there are differing opinions about every direction or decision in life. **We do need to pray** for our leaders and their role as our models and leaders in our church family.

Aurelius Augustine once reminded his officers in the church, "All disturbers are to be rebuked, the low-spirited to be encouraged, the infirm to be supported, objectors confuted, the treacherous guarded against, the unskilled taught, the lazy aroused, the contentious restrained, the haughty repressed, litigants pacified, the poor relieved, the oppressed liberated, the good approved, the evil borne with, and ALL ARE TO BE LOVED. "



Questions and Answers to Instruct the Faithful: The Ten Commandments Given by God through Moses at Mt. Sinai after the Exodus of the Jews from Egypt (circa 1200 BC). These Commandments tell us how God expects us to live as a response to God's gracious saving acts toward the Jews and toward us, as well.

What is the Third Commandment? "You shall not make wrongful use of the name of the Lord your God." (Exodus 20:7 and Deuteronomy 5:11)

What do you learn from this commandment? "I should use God's name with reverence and awe. God's name is taken in vain when used to support wrong. It is insulted when used carelessly, as in a curse or a pious cliché." (see Psalms 29:2, 103:1-2 and 138:2; Ephesians 4:29 and Revelation 15:3-4)

What is the fourth Commandment? "Remember the Sabbath day, and keep it holy." (Exodus 20:8 and Deuteronomy 5:12)

What do you learn from this commandment? "God requires a special day to be set apart so that worship can be at the center of my life. It is right to honor God with thanks and praise, and to hear and receive God's Word, so that I may have it in my heart and on my lips, and put it into practice in my life." (see Genesis 2:3, Leviticus 23:3, Deuteronomy 5:12, Acts 2:42-46 and Romans 10:8)

From our 1998 Presbyterian Church USA "Study Catechism." Catechisms have been part of the Presbyterian tradition since the Reformation in the 1500's, presenting questions and answers to explain the Christian faith. We hope these will help you in understanding your Christian faith.

### **RESURRECTION SUNDAY ANTICIPATED**



### WHAT IS YOUR DREAM OR VISION FOR FIRST PRES?

VISONS AND VISONARIES: We all know of people we call visionaries ... let's remember a few:

**William Wilberforce** (1759-1833), who labored 26 years in the English Parliament to end the slave trade (1807) and to abolish slavery (1833) in the English Empire, said, "God Almighty has set before me two great objects: the suppression of the slave trade and the reformation of manners."

**President John F. Kennedy** in his inaugural address, Jan. 20 1961, said "And so, my fellow Americans: ask not what your country can do for you--ask what you can do for your country."

**Martin Luther King** on the steps of the Lincoln Memorial, on Aug. 28, 1963, said, "I have a dream that one day ... right there in Alabama, little black boys and black girls will be able to join hands with little white boys and white girls as sisters and brothers."

**OUR BIBLE** is full of visions and visionaries:

**The Liberator Moses** saw and heard a vision in the burning bush when the Lord spoke, saying, "I am sending you to Pharaoh to bring my people the Israelites out of Egypt." (Exodus 3:10)

**The Prophet Ezekiel** saw the valley of dry bones and thought of the Jews dispersed from their patrimony into Egypt, Assyria and Babylonia, and he had a vision in which the Lord said, "... these bones are Israel ... I will bring ... back to the land of Israel." (Ezekiel 37)

Jesus had a vision when he proclaimed "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me ... to preach good news ... to proclaim freedom ... and recovery of sight ... to release the oppressed, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor." (Luke 4:18-19)

**The Apostle Peter** had a vision when he preached to the crowds gathered in Jerusalem, when the Holy Spirit was given to the disciples, saying that this event was the fulfillment of what the Old Testament prophet Joel envisioned, "In the last days,' God says, 'I will pour out my Spirit on all people. Your sons and daughters will prophesy; your young men will see visions; your old men will dream dreams." (Acts 1:14-21)

**What are your visions and dreams?** You are a part of the Jerusalem crowd who became followers of Jesus. As a follower of Jesus, you too have been given the Holy Spirit who will give you visions and dreams.

What are our visions and dreams as a community of followers of Jesus at First Pres? What visions do we have for our future, for our common life together and for our Christian mission to our community and to the world around us, whether in Newhall, Los Angeles, Guatemala, the Dominican Republic, Tijuana, wherever?

While we decry difficulties and struggles in which we find ourselves, remember that the Chinese character for crisis is composed of two characters: one represents danger, but the other represents opportunity. What new opportunities, what new dreams and visions is God giving us, even as old ones become passé? Is God leading us into ministries we never imagined? Let us all talk with each other on the patio, in our groups, in our committees, on the Deacons, on the Session, and in staff meetings about the dreams and visions for First Pres that the Holy Spirit is giving us.



### **Bean Counter's Corner**

D. James Kennedy in his book, <u>Freedom From Financial Fear</u>, spends a chapter discussing Malachi 3. He states that God identified 3 points in these verses. God describes a *Problem* among His people and He then gives them a *Prescription* to solve it which was the condition for receiving a marvelous *Promise* of blessings.

Here was the problem – people had been robbing God and the curse of God hung over their heads and caused them and their nation to languish. The curse was upon their financial well-being. It is a terrible thing to live under God's financial curse. How were the people robbing God? They were not giving God their tithes and offering.

In all languages, tithe means tenth. That means you should be giving God  $1/10^{th}$  of all your income. Now some people may ask, "Is that net or gross?" Well, I have a question for you? Do you want God's blessing on your net or gross income? The offering is giving beyond the tithe. Anything less is robbing God.

Now there are reasons why God wants our tithes. The number one reason is that God wants us to understand that He is **THE** sovereign ruler and owner of the world. God is letting us use His world for a while. By tithing, we acknowledge God's sovereign ownership of the earth and all that is within it.

Reason number 2 is that God wants us to learn to trust Him! The greatest lesson in life is to learn is to trust God. It's the subject of the whole curriculum and tithing is one course on how to do it. It is a VERY IMPORTANT course to learn! Tithing is a great lesson in faith. Tithing is not a matter of finances, but of faith. God says if we tithe, He will open the windows of Heaven and pour out a blessing on us. If we don't, we are cursed.

Another reason is that God wants to use this method for the advancement of His Kingdom here on earth. He has chosen us to have a role in winning people to Christ all over the world. When the tithe is withheld, we are cursing people all over the world who will not hear the gospel. Dr. Kennedy describes a time when he saw a car bumper sticker which read "Honk if you love Jesus." Then a few days later he saw one that said "Tithe if you love Jesus. Anyone can honk."

Finally, we can tithe without loving Christ, but we can't love Christ without tithing. The motive for giving is not "to get," but to show love. Dr. Kennedy states, "God so loved that He gave. We should so love that we give. Yet, amazingly, when we do give, God has arranged it so that we don't lose anything, because He promised to bless us!"

So what is God's prescription? It is simple: "Bring all the tithes into the storehouse." The storehouse equals the church so the tithe should go to the church. Other offerings can go to other organizations but the tithe goes to the church. The tithe is holy unto the Lord and should be given. It is timeless. From the beginning until now, tithe has been part of the worship of the people of God. The tithe helps the work of the church to continue. Churches languish because members do not give their tithes. Therefore, the work of Christ does not go on.

But there is God's promise to look forward to. When we tithe, God opens the windows of Heaven and pours out His blessing on us. Obey His command and there won't be enough room to receive the blessing. The more that is given, the more you are blessed!

The offering shows the true extent of our love and faith in God. Go beyond the tithe and God's blessing is exceedingly multiplied. Show your gratitude by obeying Him and bringing tithes and offerings to the Lord. The purpose of giving to the Lord is to glorify God. Show your gratitude and thankfulness. Advance the work and the cause of Christ. Don't do it simply "to get."

God's promises are repeated several times in the Bible such as Proverbs 3:9-10, Proverbs 11:24, and Luke 6:38. These promises are opposite of what the world's view is: "Hold onto it and you shall have." God says, "Give it away and you shall have."

## A Love for Mission - - in The World by Carole Wheeler

Carol Weir (1924-2010) devoted her life to mission in the Middle East. In 1953 Carol and her husband Ben were appointed to serve as PC(USA) missionaries in Lebanon. Initially they served in a Shiite Muslim community in south Lebanon. Later they lived in Beirut where Carol taught Christian Education courses at the Nar East School of Theology. Ben was appointed PC(USA) Commission Representative in Lebanon and Syria. He made mission trips to coordinate work in Iraq, Syria, and Iran. They officially served until 1985.

On May 8, 1984, as Carol and Ben left their apartment, Ben was kidnapped by one faction in Lebanon's civil war. He was held for 16 months, 14 months of it in solitary confinement. During his entire captivity Carol and many others

worked tirelessly for Ben's release. He was finally freed on September 14, 1985.

Through the entire ordeal, Carol never ceased to urge everyone to pray for all of the people in the war-torn country, including Ben's captors. Though never comfortable in the unwelcome spotlight Ben's captivity thrust upon her, Carol remained a steadfast advocate for peace, understanding, and reconciliation in the Middle East.


I had a chance meeting with Carol in 1985, soon after Ben's release. It was in the dining room of the Presbyterian Conference Center in Montreat, N.C., during a Peacemaking Conference. I asked if I might join a woman for breakfast and

soon realized it was Carol Weir! As a result of that chance meeting I read Carol and Ben's book Hostage Bound, Hostage Free with great interest. I treasure Carol's words from a 1997 presentation.

"Mission includes some aspect of consciously chosen struggle. In mission we open ourselves up to the reality of the world and we pray for the grace to enter deeply into human suffering. someone has said we will not enlarge the old essence of the gospel by adding old and new dogmas. We will enlarge it by adding the world."

## $Sacraments \ of the \ Church \qquad {\tt by \ Sonja \ Tweedie}$

A few years ago, there was a survey of questions about our church in which the congregation participated. It was interesting to note that the answer to "How many sacraments do we celebrate in the Presbyterian Church?" was anywhere from 1 to 10+. In other words, some people just were not sure. That is easy to understand when many members came from various protestant denominations and many from the Roman Catholic Church which has seven sacraments.

The PC(USA) (our church) and many mainline denominations have only two: The Sacrament of Baptism and Holy Communion (the Lord's Supper).

Baptism is the sign and seal of incorporation into Christ. Jesus in his own baptism was attested Son of the Father and was anointed with the Holy Spirit to undertake the way of the servant as manifested in his suffering, death and resurrection.

In Baptism we participate in Jesus' death and resurrection as we die to what separates us from God and are raised to newness of life in Christ. The water of Baptism symbolizes the waters of Creation, the Flood and the Exodus from Egypt and links us to the goodness of God's creation and to the covenant with Noah and Israel. Baptism is the sign and symbol of inclusion in God's grace and covenant with the church.

The Baptism of children witnesses to the truth that God's love claims people before they are able to respond in faith. Baptism is received only once. As there is one body, there is one Baptism. The PC(USA) recognizes all Baptisms with water in the name of the Father, Son and Holy spirit administered by other churches.

The Sacrament of Holy Communion or the Lord's Supper is celebrated at different times in different congregations. Many celebrate Communion weekly, some monthly and others quarterly. The Session of each Presbyterian church determines how often Communion is held. Our Session chooses to celebrate Holy Communion on the first Sunday of each month as well as on Maundy Thursday.

The Lord's Supper is the sign and seal of eating and drinking in communion with the crucified and risen Lord. In the Lord's Supper the church, gathered for worship, blesses God for all He has done through creation, redemption and sanctification; gives thanks that God is working in the world and in the Church in spite of human sin; gratefully anticipates the fulfillment of the Kingdom Christ proclaimed, and offers itself in obedient service to God's reign.

At the Lord's table, the church is renewed and empowered by the memory of Christ's life, death and resurrection and promise to return; sustained by Christ's pledge of undying love and continuing presence with God's covenant of grace through partaking of Christ's self-offering.

As the people of God bless and thank God the Father and remember Jesus Christ the Son, they call upon the Holy Spirit to lift them into Christ's presence, to accept their offering of bread and wine, to make breaking bread and sharing the cup a participation in the body and blood of Christ, to bind them with Christ and with one another, to unite them in communion with all the faithful in heaven and on earth, to nourish them with Christ's body and blood that they may mature in the fullness of Christ and to keep them faithful as Christ's body, representing Christ and doing God's work in the world.

These two sacraments keep us focused on Christ and remind us of who we are and whose we are!
