PASTOR COLUMN MAY 2017 — FORGIVENESS

For a long time God has been showing me just how important it is that I confess my sins to Him for my own welfare. Yet some people at my former church argued that we don't emphasize the grace of God enough when we focus on our sinfulness. For me, there can be no grace without the admission that we need grace! I even changed what I called it for a contemporary service; instead of calling it confession, I labeled it MYS-TERY and approached it tactilely with people using various experiences like crumpling up paper, symbolic of things they didn't like about their behavior, and burning it. Lately I've been explaining the need for Confession as we confess in our 2nd Service. Then I came upon an article from Jill Duffield, the editor of our Presbyterian Outlook Magazine. She remembers picking up one of her children from school one day. Her daughter could hardly wait for her teacher to shut the car door before telling her what happened on the playground. A classmate, one with whom she had a strained relationship, one who had that very day teased her about her relative lack of athletic skills, had, while showing off her own athletic prowess, unceremoniously fallen face first out of the swing. My child finished off the telling of this morality tale of instant retribution with a loud, satisfying, sing-songy, "Karrrrrrmaa!

Jill responded with "No! We believe in grace, not karma." To which her young daughter rolled her eyes and continued grinning at the karma this girl received.

I ask you, "Do you believe in karma, or grace?" It has occurred to me that it can't be both. Our Bible is filled with examples of God not giving us what we deserve, rather offering us His grace. We sing the hymn "Amazing Grace" with gusto, but we often operate out of the principle of karma. "He'll get what's coming to him some day."

Week after week we recite the prayer of confession and hear the assurance of pardon, but do we pray and receive them? Are we aware deep in our bones of our need for mercy-both God's and other's – or are we secretly (and not so secretly) hoping for some karma, because, compared to most, we aren't that bad? Could it be that we have lost sight of the radical nature of the words we speak on Sunday morning, "Forgive us our debts, AS we forgive our debtors"?

Unless we have a deep sense of our need for God's grace and mercy, we really can't genuinely extend it to others. Miroslav Volf asserts that we live in a "culture stripped of grace," yet the voice of the prophets keeps ringing out, "God desires mercy, not sacrifice." In fact, we salivate not just for karma, but for payback pressed down, shaken up and running over. And too often it's not justice we want to flow down like a river, but revenge, humiliation, and punishment.

This is food for thought (at least in my life). Indeed, wrote Canon Peter Green, "Only the man who is prepared to own his share in the guilt of the cross may claim his share in its grace."

CHURCH LIFE TRIP TO FOREST LAWN REMEMBERED

On Saturday, March 25th a dozen or so First Presbyterian Church of Newhall members gathered together and made a trip to Glendale to experience a unique Southern California adventure. Nestled in the hills of Glendale is a Treasure I never knew existed. The Hall of the Crucifixion – Resurrection.

About 2 years ago Pastor Bill spoke about his trip to the Hall of the Crucifixion – Resurrection. The seed being planted, Church Life Committee finally was able to put together this visit to Forest Lawn.

The masterpiece of noted Polish artist Jan Styka, **The Crucifixion**, is the largest framed mounted canvas painting in the world, standing 195' long by 45' high. It is behind a massive curtain, and as it is dramatically revealed, shows the stories of the Crucifixion and resurrection of Christ. What makes **The Crucifixion** so impressive is not its size, but its detail. It is not just a great painting, it is many masterful paintings within a painting.

In 1894, Ignacy Jan Paderewski, noted musician, statesman, and Premier of Poland conceived a painting of the crucifixion of Christ and inspired fellow countryman Jan Styka with the idea. For two years, the artist studied and sketched in the Holy Land - and on his way back to Poland, Styka knelt in Rome before Pope Leo the XIII to have his palette blessed. The gigantic canvas, made to order, awaited his return.

The first exhibition in Warsaw was marked by all Europe as the greatest religious and artistic event of the century. In 1904, Styka brought the painting to America hoping to see it displayed at the St. Louis Exposition, but no suitable place was found. Pressed with obligations and expenses, he was forced to return to Poland without his masterpiece. He never saw it again.

The Crucifixion was lost to the world until news of its existence reached Dr. Hubert Eaton, founder of Forest Lawn. After a lengthy search, he located and purchased the painting in 1944 and set in motion the work that would lead to its permanent display.

After enjoying this magnificent program, we meandered over to an exhibit of David Bowie called **David Bowie: Among the Mexican Masters**. It was an interesting display chronicling the rock legend's trip to Mexico 20 years ago. We all enjoyed the beautiful thoughtful photography.

Next on our agenda was the **Last Super Window.** It is a stunning stained glass masterpiece recreating Michelangelo's greatest art piece. As we sat in the "Memorial Court of Honor" and admired it, we listened to and enjoyed its story. It was a wonderful exhibit of a magnificent work of art. We were all very impressed.

We then cruised on over to the **Church of the Recessional**, and enjoyed this gorgeous little church and its beautiful gardens. John had the opportunity to try out a cart that is used to move coffins; it was not that comfortable!

We then parted company and cruised the grounds of this peaceful and gorgeous place on our own. We encourage all of you to visit Forrest Lawn in Glendale and take in this magnificent place. Oh yeah.... And it's free. Maybe the whole church

YOUTH ARE HOME FROM MISSION TRIP TO MIAMI FLORIDA—Sarah Bolin and Youth Committee

Thank you so much for giving our High Schoolers the opportunity to serve in Miami Florida this past Spring Break. Here are some pictures from our trip.

While in Miami our kids served in two different areas, *The Miami Children's Initiative* and a foster community known as *His House*. With the Miami Children's Initiative, the Team did a lot of cleaning until the kids finished their school time, then played with them and assisted them in classrooms where they were doing homework. This was a real cross-cultural event for the Team.

His House is a former military base with 30 homes, each housing 5 or 6 foster children assigned to the home's foster parents. The Team assisted in organizing community resources (stacks of board games, donated clothing, sports equipment and a "market" for the parents) used by the families. Then after school, the Team played outdoors with the children, sang with them, and interacted well with over 150 kids!

Affirmation Night for the Team was particularly powerful for each and every one of them.

Again, Linda and Jesse were the Praying Pelican Mission team leaders, the same ones our Team had last year in San Francisco, and they have promised to try to be our FPCN team leaders next year, wherever we go with PPM. Linda and Jesse have been very pleased with our youth missionaries.

On May 7th, our students will share their experiences in church on **Youth Sunday**. They will share stories, preach the sermon, provide music and share their hearts in church for one service at 9:30. There will not be a 2nd service on Youth Sunday. Plan to be there and be blessed!

MARK YOUR CALENDARS —MEETING TO DISCUSS HUMAN TRAFFICKING


First Presbyterian Church of Newhall will host a discussion about human trafficking at 4:00 pm on Sunday, May 21 in the Sanctuary. A representative from **ZOE** International will be the speaker. The organization was founded in 2002.

ZOE fights against child trafficking in three ways: prevention, rescue, and restoration. The goal is to rescue children from human traffickers and provide the children with new life. With currently 20.9 million victims of human trafficking worldwide, ZOE makes every effort to rescue children in need. From spreading child trafficking awareness to feeding and educating human trafficking survivors, ZOE does everything it can to ensure the safety and well-being of children.

ZOE currently has a home in Northern Thailand and has been doing work there for almost 15 years. Currently their children's home has over 70 children, both girls and boys, and is continuing to grow.

As of August 2016 ZOE purchased property in the north end of Los Angeles to open a children's home to care for children that are being rescued right here in LA County. The ZOE team is working with a team of professionals in order to build the first home for 6

In April, Jack Irwin hosted three of us to attend a Bridges Gala Fundraising Dinner in Pasadena. Bridges is an organization that meets with people in the community who choose not to go to church, and brings church to them. It is a very heartwarming and important way to introduce our faith to others who might not have heard the word. —Lynn Parkinson

Everyone already "belongs" at First Presbyterian Church of Newhall - but maybe you are ready to make it "official."



WHAT IS WORSHIP? By Kathy Bressler

The word "Worship" is a very common term in Christian circles; I have always wondered exactly what it meant. Strangely, the word itself sometimes seems to have negative vibes for me. I am a lover of classic novels and often come across the phrase, "Your Worship" when someone is petitioning for favors to a person of a higher status. In satirical writing, it is often used facetiously as a term of groveling. I think it is also an uncomfortable word in our culture where we believe "All people are created equal." As Christians, we expect ourselves to be humble and not accept worship of ourselves by anyone. Nor should we worship anyone else. One exception in our culture, of course, is the somewhat irrational practice of worshipping rock stars, athletes and the like, and they in turn being most happy to accept the worship of hordes of fans. Jesus taught that they have their reward and that we should seek other things such as the Kingdom of God. (Matthew 6). Considering the above, when we are taught that we should "Worship God," it could make us feel uneasy, that we are perhaps giving Him something that He wouldn't want: groveling for His favor so that He would be flattered and give us the things that we want, or aggrandizing Him as if He were some supernatural ego-centric rock star.

So, I go to Webster's to find the definition of worship and try to determine how it applies to what we do on Sunday mornings and how we relate to God in general.

- 1. Chiefly British: A person of importance used as a title for various officials (as magistrates and some mayors).
- 2. Reverence offered a divine being or supernatural power; also: an act of expressing such reverence.
- 3. A form of religious practice with its creed and ritual.
- 4. Extravagant respect or admiration for, or devotion to, an object of esteem, worship of the dollar.

Definitions 1 and 4 are the negative meanings of "worship" that were tripping me up, and they actually have nothing to do with God or our church experience. Definition 3 explains our experiences on Sunday mornings in church and justifies calling that activity "Worship." Definition 2 is the expression of how we relate to God. We have (or should have) reverence towards God and act in ways that express that reverence. This is what He wants in a relationship with us: the same thing that we also want in all our own close relationships, honor, respect, appreciation, unconditional love and admiration (Webster's again). There are many examples in scripture; there is plenty of material for a future article.

As a member of the Worship and Music Committee, and a long-time history buff, I decided to look into definition 3 (above). How did our form of religious practice, with its creeds and rituals, develop? To do it justice would take far more space than I have here. Just to trace back the origins of the multitude of rituals and practices in the various modern denominations would be more than daunting.

For the purposes of this article, I will skip all that and go back to the basics: the earliest believers. What did their corporate worship look like? All of the Disciples and earliest followers of Christ were Jews or Jewish proselytes. Their worship centered in the Temple in Jerusalem and in synagogues and homes in outlying areas. They did not see their movement as a "new" religion, or separate in any way from Judaism. What we call the "Old Testament" was the scripture they studied fervently. An Apostle or other learned person was their pastor (rabbi) who stood or sat in front of the parishioners, presided and taught. They had music including scripture chanted and sung, liturgy and prayer. Even the sacraments of Baptism and Communion had Jewish roots in the practices of dedicating their babies (Circumcision), ritual bathing (Mikveh) and the Passover Seder. Sharing of a meal was standard. All of that sounds very familiar to our modern ears.

To be fair, some of their communal practices fell out of use fairly early in Church History. They kept the Sabbath (Saturday) religiously, met as a congregation daily, and were expected to share all of their earthly possessions with one another. In our culture, we would find those practices a bit too much!

Gradually as the church disbursed through persecution, and Gentiles were added to their numbers in far-away places, Sunday (called the Lord's Day) developed as the Holy Day of Worship, along with many other additions and changes. However, for the most part, we have kept the basics forms of worship handed down from the first-generation Christians who inherited them from their Jewish roots.




