## PASTOR COLUMN NOVEMBER 2014

There have been many splits and reunions in the Presbyterian Church over its American history. No surprise that the recent decisions of our General Assembly have been met with some disapproval. That disapproval has cost our community at least two beloved and wonderful families. (We are saddened by their decision – and have let both know that we would welcome them back at any time – and I have prayed with them as they left.) These decisions revolve around three issues:

The **first** regards allowing Pastors and congregations the freedom to officiate/host same sex weddings “as their conscience permits.” *“Exercising such discretion and freedom of conscience under the prayerful guidance of Scripture, teaching elders may conduct a marriage service for any such couple in the place where the community gathers for worship, so long as it is approved by the session; or in such other place as may be suitable for a service of Christian worship. In no case shall any teaching elder’s conscience be bound to conduct any marriage service for any couple except by his or her understanding of the Word, and the leading of the Holy Spirit.”*

The **second** calls for a “season of serious study and discernment” about the meaning of Christian marriage and passed a new definition of marriage that would change the constitutional definition of marriage from “between a man and a woman” to “between two people, traditionally between a man and a woman.”

And the **third** involves a decision to divest our denominations’ investments in a portfolio that includes three companies which supply equipment that is involved in destroying Palestinian communities in Israel.

The conversations about sexual orientation began in 1978. My College Pastor, Don Williams, wrote one of the theological presentations and was instrumental in the resulting authoritative interpretation that year that declared “homosexuality does not accord with God’s plan for humanity.” It has come up time and time again until a moratorium was placed upon any decision during at least two General Assemblies in the 90’s. Until later in the first decade of the millennium I have held a traditional view. Most of the theological work up to that point seemed to me to rely heavily on the “love of God” rather than focus on the brief areas of scripture where homosexuality is discussed. Relying on my reading of Scripture, I could not in good conscience support any change, even though in my clinical world of therapy there was increasing evidence that our sexuality is not a personal choice.

Then I was chosen in 2010 to be sent as a voting delegate from our Presbytery of San Fernando to General Assembly in San Jose. I knew this would be one of many issues that would come from committee to be voted on, so I selected 3 books with conservative theological perspectives and 3 books with progressive/liberal theological perspectives to re-educate myself on the theological debate. These books relied on good exegesis of the 6 seminal passages which discuss homosexuality in Scripture. This study prayerfully changed my perspective and my vote as a delegate at that assembly, but I continue to have great respect people who have a different view, recognizing that all of us are struggling to determine what is right.. (*I have written a lengthy paper on my findings, and did teach an adult education class on my findings when I returned from G.A. in 2010, and will make it available to anyone who wishes to read it.*)

There are times in a Pastor’s life (and many other folks) when we wish that we could bury our head and ignore any change in our comfortable world crying, “Can’t we all just get along?” However, as disciples of Jesus we each must examine our lives using prayer and study to discern where the Lord is leading us. This has been one of those times in my life. However, taking a stand differing from many things I’ve been taught by many wonderful men and women who have guided my Christian growth is very frightening and I walk with fear and trepidation in prayer that God continue to guide me through the Holy Spirit.

These decisions have already caused an exodus from the Episcopalian Church. Change is never easy on any institution, and especially religious institutions. You may be interested to know that other religious organizations sanction Same-Sex Marriages, such as; Evangelical Lutheran Church, United Church of Christ, Society of Friends (Quaker), Unitarian Universalist Association of Churches, Reform Jewish Movement, and the Conservative Jewish Movement, Episcopal Church, and now Presbyterian Church (USA). It is interesting that with the new Pope, that conversation is happening in the Roman Catholic Church as well.

As Presbyterians we welcome and respect the importance of one another’s theology. You may be asking, “What can we do about it?” Talk to one another. If you have questions or concerns, I encourage you to share them. If

To my dear, sweet fellow Presbyterians,







### *Four Rabbis, A Big Fish, Russell Crowe And How They All Might Just Teach Us Something About How To Read The Bible. (Part One) by Roland Wrinkle*

*The Four Rabbis:* Somebody pretty smart once said, "*The basic task of exegesis* [how to figure out the meaning of biblical passages] *is to address, as a whole and in parts, the historical questions: What was the author saying to the readers; and why? These questions ultimately demand an answer at the broadest level in the form of a hypothesis to be tested against the verse-by-verse details.*" It has always seemed to me, that the testing hypothesis can usually be found in the understanding that the great authors of the Old Testament books were great storytellers – invariably living in an oral culture. God is the master storyteller. All of the Bible is set ablaze by stories – stories which are all one story. When his son climbed up to the top of the mount (and when he came down off of it), he was telling stories – stories which could be understood within the context of the singular, overarching story told by his father. Holocaust survivor Elie Wiesel (in the tradition of his, and our, Jewish forefathers) tells this wonderful tale:

*"When the great Rabbi Israel Baal Shem-Tov saw misfortune threatening the Jews it was his custom to go into a certain part of the forest to meditate. There he would light a fire, say a special prayer, and the miracle would be accomplished and the misfortune averted. Later, when his disciple, the celebrated Magid of Mezritch, had occasion, for the same reason, to intercede with heaven, he would go to the same place in the forest and say: "Master of the Universe, listen! I do not know how to light the fire, but I am still able to say the prayer." And again the miracle would be accomplished. Still later, Rabbi Moshe-Leib of Sasov, in order to save his people once more, would go into the forest and say: "I do not know how to light the fire, I do not know the prayer, but I know the place and this must be sufficient." It was sufficient and the miracle was accomplished. "Then it fell to Rabbi Israel of Rizhyn to overcome misfortune. Sitting in his armchair, his head in his hands, he spoke to God: "I am unable to light the fire and I do not know the prayer; I cannot even find the place in the forest. All I can do is to tell the story, and this must be sufficient." And it was sufficient."*

*"God made man because he loves stories."* Those to whom Jesus was speaking from that mount were familiar with God's story. What Jesus was trying to get them to understand was that the familiar story was now all being reworked around him. The problem for us is exactly the opposite, i.e. we are all too familiar with the story of Jesus and all too unfamiliar with the story that he assumed his audience was steeped in. If either story is ignored, the pieces just won't fit.

*The Big Fish.* Now, let's test this hypothesis against the verse by verse details of the story of Jonah and the Whale. Who was the most despicable enemy of the Jews? Clearly, Assyria. Jonah was so appalled by God's request to have him give fair warning to Nineveh (capital of the Assyrian Empire), he took off in the opposite direction. It was unthinkable to this Hebrew prophet that he would be asked to aid in the salvation of the wicked city which had dedicated itself to tormenting Israel. He tried to hide from God (not exactly a brilliant idea) but God caught up with him and Jonah got himself swallowed up by apparently a really, really big fish. Jonah then pleaded to God in what sounds a lot like a Psalm but amounts to an ancient version of "God, get me out of this pickle and I promise....." God answered him and then promptly sent him back to finish the job of rescuing Nineveh—this time successfully. But Jonah was so ticked off that he had played a part in granting salvation to the gigantic city of Israel's most hated enemy he wanted to die. He grew a bush to give him shade and God killed the bush. Here's how God responded to Jonah:

*"You are concerned about the bush, for which you did not labor and which you did not grow; it came into being in a night and perished in a night. And should I not be concerned about Nineveh, that great city, in which there are more than a hundred and twenty thousand persons who do not know their right hand from their left, and also many animals?"*

In the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus might well have said, "*You have heard it said God loves your enemies because they are all his precious ikons (images of God); now, you need to love your enemies as well.*" Well, that's pretty much what he *actually* did say. Then we bellyache, "That's just too much to swallow [get the pun?]-there must be another way to read this passage." But "*Love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you*" is not a metaphor. It cannot be circumvented by root-word studies in ancient Aramaic or Greek. It is simply and plainly a working out of the story of Jonah in the new context of all of accepted scripture being reworked around and through Jesus of Nazareth as the fulfillment, climax and culmination of all of those scripture stories.

So back to the Jonah tale (another pun). We moderns read this story and say, "The ancients didn't have the benefit of modern science and didn't realize that it would be ridiculous to believe that a man could be swallowed by a sea serpent, be spit out after three days and still live. Well, guess what? Those ignorant ancients knew as well as we do that such a scenario violated everything they knew about the physical world. Sure, they knew nothing about molecular biology but they knew enough not to fall for big fish tales. But they appreciated what we tend to miss, i.e. that the *story was not about a really big fish but was about how God loves our enemies.* He has the *audacity to love our enemies!* How dare he? We (Jonah) tend to get all out of sorts about the ridiculous undeserved grace and promiscuous love of God—at least when it comes to others. I know God loves me and so it only stands to reason that he would hate those who hate me. But that's apparently not the way it works. And that's the reason these stories were told and told over and over again for centuries before somebody decided to write them all down. What was the author trying to say? What is the meaning behind the story? What does God want us to learn from these stories? With the Book of Jonah, the answer is simple: God loves our enemies and it doesn't seem to make much difference that this tends to piss us off—and, now, in anticipation of God's New Age we are being called upon to move in the direction of becoming fully human where we will be able to love our enemies as well. **This is a Kingdom story.** If you want science stories, listen to Stephen Hawking. If you want fish stories, listen to the pastor—and read the Bible and search for meaning. Remember, *God made man because he loves stories.*

## Family AMOR October 2014 by John Favalessa



Seventeen of us departed Saturday morning October 11th on our adventure to build a home for a desperately poor family. Weeks of planning and preparation were now becoming a reality. We had five “first timers” joining us. After a safe journey we arrived at the AMOR campsite with a couple of hours of daylight left to set up camp and heat the lasagna. The next morning after breakfast we drove to the worksite to meet the family whose lives we’d hoped to make easier.



While all the worksites in Tijuana present challenges, this one was unique. The slab was on the backside of their current home, which had dirt floors but a pretty good roof. There was no room on the sides to walk to the back. So we had to carry everything through the house. We cut all the wood out front and then carried it up the stairs and through the house in a conga line to the back; same for all the building materials including the heavy concrete bags.

Engaging with the family is a treasured part of the experience but not always realized. Well, since they had to take down the back wall of their existing structure we got to peer into their lives. We saw they had two twin beds and a couch...for three children and two adults; we saw mom cooking dinner on a small stove; we saw dad trying to sleep on the couch as he works night shift; we saw the children eating at their makeshift table; we saw mom washing clothes on a scrub board. Monday was a school day and the children wore plaid uniforms. They youngest girl had a white pleated skirt and they all wore white shirts. It was amazing to me that their white clothes were whiter than our white clothes! It was unbelievable as they literally live in dust. The children were well behaved, had bright smiles and sparkling eyes.



This home was a couple of blocks away from the home we built for Sylvia two years earlier. So at lunch we drove a group over to see how she was doing. She had been undergoing chemo for breast cancer when we built her home. Sylvia was so surprised and joyous to see us. She remembered all of us. We learned that she was now cancer free! We hugged and took pictures. We were rejuvenated to go back to our job site and work harder. Later that afternoon, when mom came home from work (she’s a seamstress making wedding sheets) and saw the walls and roof up. In the words of Jana Baker, “She was so happy that she burst into tears. This family of five had lived in two rooms and now we were doubling their living space.” We were all so filled with the joyous emotions of the moment. I knew all the effort that went into this trip was

so worth it. So we were blessed with another safe and tremendously successful AMOR trip where we got more back than we gave.

Footnote: we didn’t finish the roof or start to stucco but Brentwood Presbyterian Church was coming down in a few days and would finish! Building for God’s Kingdom!

Oh, another footnote: It literally took us nine minutes to cross the border into the USA! In the past we’ve waited as long as 4 plus hours!

Our next trip will be after Easter. These trips are expensive as we pay for all the building materials for the homes and it would not be possible without the support of the Mission Committee through your donations. Thank you all!
