Recently, I was asked, "Why does the church have to get involved with politics?" It was a thoughtful question and I've done some thinking about that very issue. After all, Jesus (much to the chagrin of Judas) never condemned Rome. Paul shared that governments have been given power by God (Romans 13). But then I remembered a reflection by John Buchanan about these lines from the Preamble of The Declaration of Independence; "We hold these truths to be selfevident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness."

The radical notion that every human being has unalienable rights, innate worth and dignity, and that the first purpose of government is to protect and persevere this idea, we are told, came from Enlightenment thinkers like John Locke. But it also comes from Genesis, with the equally radical proposal that human beings are created in the image of the Creator, that their worth and the rights that stem from it are basic to their very nature and identity. This is why people of faith cannot accommodate the denial of basic human rights and dignity, and why churches become involved in the never-ending struggle to establish and protect those rights for all people. The Church must embrace all the questions of life, and in every situation, and with every talent, means, and time, ask what God is calling us to do with the resources God has given us.

We are approaching Stewardship season in our church family. I know that brings to mind immediately the issue of money, and; "Here goes the church asking for more..." Again I will reply, "Stewardship is the issue of ATTITUDE, about our lives. As Christians what is it that drives our attitudes? It is, simply put, that God has created us and given us everything we have, and put us in charge of all the decisions, hoping (though I'm not certain what that means when applied to God) that we know God so well that, like faithful children, we make choices that will be in concert with the will of God for this world. So this season we are calling "STEWARDSHIP OF YOUR LIFE." Let me leave you with the following poem by James Russell Lowell:

The Worship Committee will strive with God's guidance and grace, to create Christ-centered worship experiences, inspiring God's people as they respond to the word proclaimed in prayer, song, scripture, sacrament and message.

PRAYER IN WORSHIP by Sonja Tweedie

Christian worship joyfully ascribes all praise and honor, glory and power to the triune God. In worship the people of God acknowledge God's presence in the world and in their lives. As they respond to God's claim and redemptive action in Jesus Christ, believers are transformed and renewed. In worship the faithful offer themselves to God and are equipped for God's service in the world.

The Spirit of God quickens people to an awareness of God's grace and claim upon their lives. The Spirit moves them to respond by naming and calling upon God, by remembering and proclaiming God's acts of self-revelation in word and deed, and by committing their lives to God's reign in the world.

We do this through scripture, sermon, prayer, music and other forms of art (which might include dramFalla, dance, the use of power point, etc.) The pastor is responsible for these five parts of worship.

Prayer is at the heart of worship. In prayer, through the Holy Spirit, people seek after and are found by the one true God who has been revealed in Jesus Christ. The people listen and wait upon God, call God by name, remember God's gracious acts and offer themselves to God.

Prayer may be spoken, sung, offered in silence or enacted. Prayer grows out of the center of a person's life in response to the Spirit. Prayer is shaped by the Word of God in scripture and by the life of the community of faith. Prayer urges us towards commitment to join God's work in the world.

In prayer we respond to God in many ways. In adoration we praise God for who He is. In thanksgiving we express gratitude for what God has done. In confession we acknowledge repentance for what we as individuals and as a people have done or left undone. In supplication we plead for ourselves and the gathered community. In intercession we plead for others, on behalf of others and for the whole world. In self-dedication we offer ourselves to the purpose and glory of God.

According to our PCUSA Book of Order, our worship services are to include each of these six aspects of praver. We do this through our call to worship, our hymns, our responsive readings, our confession of faith and its assurance of pardon, our creeds, our personal 'joys and concerns,' the Lord's Prayer, our prayer of dedication, the reading of scripture and the pastor's sermon. We also have an anthem or special music and praise songs which may cover various elements of praver.

The word "worship" is defined as "the feeling or expression of reverence and adoration for a deity, of which ours is God, an act of homage or reverence to God." So, you will note, our whole worship service is a "prayer of adoration." As Richard J. Foster wrote on prayer of adoration; "Praver is the human response to the perpetual outpouring of love by which God lays siege to every soul. When our reply to God is most direct of all, it is called adoration. Adoration is the spontaneous yearning of the heart to worship, honor, magnify and bless God. . . In adoration we enter the rarefied air of selfless devotion, we ask for nothing but to cherish Him. We focus on nothing but His goodness. We love God for himself, for His very being, for His radiant joy."

FRIDAY MIDDAY BIBLE STUDY (sponsored by Adult Ed Committee)

If you seek an on-going Bible study, this is a wonderful opportunity for you to learn more about the God we worship, His Son, Jesus Christ and the Holy Spirit in our lives.

REACHING OUT TO OUR BROTHERS AND SISTERS IN CHRIST IN TURKEY: THE ANTALYA EVANGELICAL CHURCH

First Pres. Newhall has a global worldview! While we do missions and ministry here at home, we also support missions in other countries. Our support to the Antalya Evangelical Church in Antalya, Turkey is part of the global outreach from Newhall. This support is part of the Great Commission that Jesus Christ gave to his disciples (which includes us) before he ascended to Heaven. He wants us to "Go into ALL THE WORLD to teach and baptize people in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit." (see Matt. 28: 18-20)

First Pres. visited the Antalya Evangelical Church. Adult Education Committee is helping our members to be "Global Christians." In November 2012, Adult Education through our Life Academy Abroad Program, expedited a tour of 24 people to Turkey to explore the places where St. Paul had ministered and spread the Gospel of Jesus Christ. One stop was Antalya, which dates back to the ancient times. Paul and Barnabas came by ship from their mission to Cyprus and landed at Attalia/Perge to spread the Gospel in the area we now call Turkey. (Acts 13:13, 14:24-26) There, we visited the Antalya Evangelical Church, met Pastor Ramazan Arkan, his wife Karen and son Joshua and other members of this small church. Pastor Arkan and his family were in the US this past spring, and Pastor Arkan preached (I'm not ashamed of the Gospel of Christ) at First Pres. Newhall on May 25, 2014!

Antalya Evangelical Church has a big mission. The Antalya Evangelical church began as a small home group in 1992 and grew to 20 members. In 1999, the church started renting space in the St. Paul Cultural Center, which is where we visited them. This is a church which is Turkish, from the Pastor down through the congregation. In major cities in Turkey, there are Christian churches attended by expatriates and retirees from other countries of the world. But Pastor Arkan estimates that there are only about 5,000 Turkish Protestant Christians in churches in Turkey, a land of 75 million people which is 99% Muslim! That's a big mission field, indeed!

Antalya Evangelical Church is building a new church facility. Pastor Arkan and his congregation have a big heart and a big vision to reach out with the Gospel of Christ to Antalya's two million citizens with love. Grown now to almost 200 members, the church is outgrowing their present quarters. They bought land and are currently building their new church facility. The first floor café and bookstore will be open to the public, and a children's play area in the basement will be used by mothers of Antalya and their children during the very hot summers (120 degrees) and rainy winters. A second floor guesthouse will accommodate Christian guests and visiting teams. The upper floors will have offices, classrooms and a sanctuary for 200. The facility will enable the church to provide programs for both church members and 'seekers' in personal development, marriage and family relationships, parenting and money management skills. This is important because there are few programs like this offered by the government or the private sector.

You can contribute to building the Antalya Evangelical Church. In the Alternative Christmas Market this December, the Missions Committee will offer you an opportunity to contribute to this project. This can be your constructive answer to the strife in the Middle East. The project budget is \$600,000; they have been raising the funds over the last ten years with about \$120,000 left to raise. It is exciting to see the Kingdom of Jesus Christ growing around the world and to be part of that!

Association board meetings where I can go and listen, but not interrupt what the HOA board is discussing. OK, being silent for an hour or more is challenging, but it's so interesting to listen to each of the elders (and pastor Bill).

The next meeting is supposed to include a review of how the church budget is created - it sounds incredibly interesting (to me, anyway).

OK, I've only attended two times but both were great, and I plan to attend each month's meeting as long as I can. Do you want to find out more before the meeting? The elders are happy to talk with you regarding their individual committees. Or just attend a session meeting. There's no rule against bringing cookies (lots of homemade ones are best) and that helps (me, anyway) to keep silent since I'm eating.

Looking forward to seeing you at the next Session meeting.

The Stewardship Committee will strive to build stewardship disciples of our church family by: transforming the hearts of believers to reflect the image of Christ, to become generous "as Christ is generous in being rich toward God" in the stewardship of all our gifts; to empower God's Kingdom work to be fully staffed, funded and shared throughout our community, country and world; and, as a committee, to monitor the fiscal responsibilities of our church ministry.

The 2015 Stewardship campaign is here!

What is Stewardship?

The Presbyterian Foundation defines Stewardship as "the way we use all our resources to carry on Christ's work of reconciliation in the world." The yearly Stewardship campaign specifically focuses on the financial responsibilities of the church and how the church will use these resources, as Christ's bride, to continue His work.

What we need you to do:

Submit your pledge: Please prayerfully consider what God is calling you to contribute, and then submit your pledge card with your commitment. Every gift counts and every intention to give is needed!

Put your pledge on Autopilot: If you aren't doing so already - please automate your pledge payment. Most major banks offer a free bill pay option that will automatically pay your pledge for you each month – free for you and free for the church. If you would like to pay your pledge via credit card, instructions for Parish Pay can be found here: http://www.presby-newhall.org/parish-payinstructions/. The church is charged a small fee for Parish Pay, but the fee is well worth it.

Catch up on your 2014 pledge if you are behind: We are currently behind by \$47,000 in pledged income. What does this mean? This means that based on last year's pledge drive we would have expected to have received \$47K more to date than we actually have.

Give extra if you are able: Our expenses so far this year are also under budget, but the church is operating at an actual loss of \$20,000. This means we have spent \$20,000 more this year than we have received in income and we are paying normal expenses from savings. So, if you can, please give a little extra.

Why is it important to share with the church what we intend to give?

The church needs to have an estimate of next year's income in order to prepare a sound budget for the coming year. Since pledges represent the majority of our budget, it is important for our planning to have a best estimate of your future financial contributions. This information helps session to be financially responsible.

What does the church do with your pledges?

- **Provides a community of faith** not only for Sunday worship but also small groups, Bible studies, a vibrant adult education program, and dynamic youth activities.
- **Represent Christ in our community and beyond** via our mission outreach programs including, but not limited to: Family Promise and A Bridge to Home (helping local homeless families and individuals get back on their feet); Samuel Dixon Family Health Center (providing medical and dental care to local low income or out of work families); AMOR (building homes for families in Mexico); providing higher education funding for students at Daystar Universities in Africa; Help the Children (provides food and necessities to struggling families around the world) and the Basic Mission Pledge (supporting the worldwide ministry and missionaries of the Presbyterian church).

How this year's campaign will work...

If the church has your email address you will be receiving an email on October 20^{th} , inviting you to send your pledge back by email. Making your pledge by email will be simple and would be a great help in preparing the budget. We will also include pledge cards in the church bulletin on Sunday October 26^{th.} Everyone who responds by Sunday, October 26, either by email or submitting a pledge card, will NOT receive the pledge letters that will go out on Monday, October 27. Our goal is to have all the pledges in by November 9 so the church budget can be prepared. Thank you in advance for helping us make this possible.

ple in Canyon Country. Tony would like to distribute more meals but is limited by his resources. The members of the Mission Committee know Tony through his participation with our church's AMOR trips. We are grateful for his noble service and are passionate about Tony's personal mission to serve those less fortunate. Therefore, we are asking our members to give their loose change for the month of October to assist Tony in feeding the homeless in our own community.

You can drop your pocket change in the brown paper bag on the Mission table between services each Sunday in October.



Do you remember the concerts at our church in 2008 and 2010 by the amazing Afrizo singers from Daystar University in Nairobi, Kenya? They have returned to the US for a concert tour this year from Aug.- Nov. 2014 to raise \$250,000 in scholarship support for Daystar students. The tour started at Daystar US offices in Minneapolis and is taking them through churches in the East, then Texas and Arizona, ending in So. Calif. with Westmont College, 1st Pres Newhall, & Trinity Pres. in Santa Ana. There will be 7 students with Hellen Mtawali, their professor and lead singer, as well as two Daystar US staff people driving the van! Plan to bring some friends to enjoy this energetic concert, 6-7:30, then gather for some refreshment with the singers. Discover their life journeys!

East Africa is impacted by many influences: Western European, sub-continental Indian, and Islamic groups (some terrorist groups included). However, Christianity is still growing the fastest in Africa. Many students arrive at Daystar with little or no funding from their home villages. The University tries to keep as many as can possibly be successful, seeking scholarship support for them. Our Mission Committee provides \$2,500 scholarship funding each year for a Daystan student.

Davstar is shining a clear Christian light in East Africa providing higher education for solid moral leadership. service, and business values. Come and support them, exchange with them our Christian warmth and love, and demonstrate our appreciation for all they do in Eas Africa for the Gospel of Jesus Christ.






