PASTOR'S COLUMN

As I write this, summer is winding down. It seems like just yesterday we were beginning summer with our Vacation Bible School, a spelunking expedition to discover more about God's love. Then we launched into our summer series of first-person experiences featuring Jesus' parables. There were so many volunteers that I haven't needed to preach all summer. (I may be rusty come September!) Each sermon was a unique and wonderful exposition of Scripture with some clever (and sometimes hilarious characters ie. "A Fly on the Wall"). What a gifted and invested congregation we have!

And what a busy summer it's been. Our Buildings and Grounds Committee, led by Elders Don Trammell and Jim Combs has teamed up with our Boy Scout Troop 609 to accomplish a number of projects that individual boys took on to accomplish their Eagle Projects. We now have better lighting in the parking lot. We have new drought resistance plants in front. And we also have path-lighting to Fellowship Hall. Each of these projects was accomplished with detailed planning by our B&G committee, the Boy Scout Troop and parents, and your participation in the pancake breakfast and hot dog roast that helped to fund the projects.

As you know we combined our two Sunday services into one service for the summer. The feedback I've received has been very good regarding this experience. Not only did our two worshipping communities get to interact, but for 5 weeks we hosted a traditional style of worship, and then for 5 weeks we hosted a contemporary style with both our choir & organ in early summer, and our band (now named *EverThirst*) in later summer. We will go back to two services on September 11, at 9:30 for traditional, and 11:15 for contemporary. As our Elders reflected on the summer experience, two ideas came about. First, that it was a good experience to bring both services together for the summer. Second, that having our two worshipping congregations interact together (though worshiping separately), needed some more time between the services. After discussion we decided to encourage 2nd Service people to arrive early for worship and have coffee and fellowship with the first service congregation. As a result we will be delaying the second service for 15 minutes to allow time to mingle.

I am looking forward to our Fall season as we have wonderful Adult Education classes and an exciting schedule of opportunities for growth in our Christian experience.

Have you visited the Patio Fellowship Table lately? Yes, you can complete your nametag. But there are other items of interest at the Fellowship Table:

- Flower arrangements for the sanctuary on Sunday mornings: Sign up for a particular Sunday to honor a birthday or anniversary or in honor/memory of a loved one(s). The list is reviewed by the church office (Bob Balkcom) every Sunday. He will contact you regarding the flowers. You can bring your own flowers or designate a dollar amount, and Bob will order the flowers for you. (Please reimburse the church for the dollar amount within the week and take the flowers with you after second service.)
- Adult Education Lending Library: Books are displayed every Sunday with a sign-out sheet. There is no charge, and no deadline in returning the book you've selected. Peruse the book selection as it changes every few weeks.

First Person Parable Series by Sonja Tweedie

Amazing! Beautiful! Sensitive! Heartwarming! Thought Provoking!

If you have missed these first person parable sermons this summer, please take time to listen to them on our website. (www.presby-newhall.org) These sermons have been a wonderful learning experience and, hopefully, most of us have grown from what these parables of Jesus have meant through the eyes and hearts of our brothers and sisters in Christ.

Parables were confusing to the people of Jesus' day and they remain so with us still today. In the book <u>How</u> <u>To Read the Bible for All Its Worth</u>, Gordon D. Fee and Douglas Stuart share ways we can glean the clearest understanding of parables. The story parables function as a means of "calling forth a response on the part of the hearer to bring them up short about their own actions." Many of the parables centered on the conflict between Jesus and the Pharisees (which I call 'Love vs Law') while many others were about the Kingdom and what it will be/is like. These parables call for us to respond to Jesus' invitation and call to discipleship. Jesus was teaching us how to live as He lived: to show mercy and love to all people.

Some presenters shared how the message of the parable had changed their lives and circumstances. This, of course, is what Jesus had intended the parables to do - to give His followers an example of how to live by caring, sharing, believing, seeing the value of life and loving their neighbors and their world.

I once wrote an article about <u>The Little Prince</u> where the fox so powerfully stated, "It is only with the heart that one can see rightly; what is essential is invisible to the eye." I believe the parables allow us to see rightly: the shepherd who had a heart for the one lost sheep, the Samaritan who understood the importance of helping someone in distress, the father who showed love and forgiveness to the son who had returned home after a life of sin and shame, the compassionate money lender who forgave both the large and small debt equally and Shane's "Sheep and Goats" message which reminded us of how important it is to care for others as Jesus did. (Thanks, Shane, for your wonderful humor!)

Jesus' many parables each have a message for us today. Thanks to our church family for sharing these parables so beautifully with us this summer.

Bean Counter's Corner

"The two most important days in your life are the day you were born and the day you find out why." - Mark Twain

The definition of "purpose" in its noun form is a reason for which something is done or created or for which something exists. The verb form definition is to have as one's intention or objective. The two definitions are pretty much the same. I know there have been numerous times in my life when I have wondered what my true purpose is. What does God want me to do with my life? I still don't know if I am doing what God wants me to do.

In the book, <u>Big Bucks! How to Make Serious Money for Both You and Your Company</u> by Ken Blanchard and Sheldon Bowles, the second test that Len must take is The Test of Purpose. He learns of this test from a woman named Roberta. The first thing she tells him is you can't make money unless making money is more important than having fun. But how do you convert fun to making money?

Once you are having fun (the first test – The Test of Joy – was previously written about) you have to focus on making money. Unless you are putting yourself in a position to make money and making money is the top priority, it will not happen.

That is the difference between a hobby and a business. Important people enjoy their work and have fun but if that is the main purpose – having fun – the business will not be successful. The fun of making money must be more important than the fun of doing business. You must believe it totally and absolutely. First comes the fun of the business, and that is powerful. Then second is the money making and that is important. If money is first and fun second, you will never get the balance right.

The world is full of people looking for ways and schemes to make money. They have it backwards. If fun is not put first, they will never tap into their potential. Never underestimate how powerful and necessary fun is in providing the intensity and the commitment to succeed. Fun has to be first because it is what gives the drive to make money a real chance of success.

Joy is powerful because of the energy fun releases. And once fun is achieved, it has to be disciplined and directed. To be a big moneymaker, the energy has to be upfront. Fun is a time priority. Making money is a strategic priority.

You have to be willing to make tough decisions. Otherwise you will not ever be wealthy. You have to have focus. The biggest financial rewards come to those with a balanced life. You have to have something that motivates you. You have to be a peak performer, not a workaholic. Peak performers are able to shut the motor down and focus on things other than work. They lead better lives than workaholics and also are more productive. Workaholics burn out. Peak performers recharge. Peak performers schedule down time. You won't find and achieve significance if you are a workaholic.

There is a difference between being obsessed and being focused. Workaholics become obsessed by their work. Peak performers stay focused on their goals – to become wealthy and have fun doing it.

What is your motivation? What is your purpose? Spend some time thinking about both and make sure it is fun and joyful for you. It is the only way to become wealthy and make bug bucks.

WISDOM FROM PASTOR BILL

As I am writing this the Olympics in Rio de Janeiro are winding down. I found myself late at night binge – watching mostly Volleyball, but was also drawn into some Field Hockey, Badminton, Ping-Pong (table tennis), Gymnastics, Soccer, Basketball, Swimming, Diving and of course the Track and Field. One special feature even recreated the rougher conditions of the 1936 Berlin Olympics in which Jesse Owens famously put it in the face of Adolph Hitler. They recreated the sand of the course on which he ran and explained how much more spring and grip modern tracks have. They even recreated the shoes exactly like Jesse Owens wore. And then had a world class sprinter try to accomplish what Owens had achieved in those primitive conditions. He



was unable to duplicate Owen's time. I still was amazed at the discipline, ability, and raw athleticism the competitors demonstrated.

I recently read that Vince Lombardi remains etched in the American psyche for one comment: "Winning isn't everything; it's the only thing." He later regretted the way his remark seemed to spin out of control much like a viral tweet in today's virtual world. "I wish I'd never said the damn thing," he said shortly before his death. "I meant the effort... I meant having a goal... I sure as hell didn't need to crush human values."

Even if Lombardi had never made that comment, the idea that winning is the only worthy outcome of effort would still run deep in the human soul. We adore success. Accomplishments determine much of our sense of worth. "Climbing ladders" is a phrase we assign to *other* people – never ourselves, thank God! – who don't like to admit that ambition has gotten the best of them.

It would be one thing if only unbelievers were enthralled with success. But Christians also frequently fuel their lives with the pursuit of worldly success. Some voice inside of us tells us that faithful people are successful. In other words, keep a pious spirit central and God will grant you a successful life.

But failure and disappointment are the heart of Christianity, just as they are basic to Christian experience. Reinhold Niebuhr condemned those who tried to make a success story out of the cross. The tree on which a man of love was despised, abandoned, and left to die is anything but a success story. The influence of that cross on the apostle Paul's life caused him to speak of "finishing the race," rather than winning the race. In the church, we sing "crown him the Lord of life, who triumphed o'er the grave. "No one has yet been bold enough to suggest a rewrite: "crown him the big success..."

In Susan Howatch's novel *Ultimate Prizes* the sister of Archdeacon Neville Aysgarth scolds him for his empty chase of worldly success. "You and your prizes! The only prize worth winning is love – and just you remember that when you're a lonely old man trying to comfort yourself with your bank balance's fading memory!" Aysgarth later reflected on the sadness of sitting alone in his grand house. "I look around at all the mementos of my past, all my prizes, and I think: what a success I was!... But after a long while I begin to hear that silence, that long, long silence ... and I know with terrible certainty that the only prize worth chasing is the prize I've managed to lose." (I quoted Peter W. Marty (publisher) from August 3, 2016 Christian Century.)

The purpose of <u>The Mission Committee</u>, in order to further share the gospel of Jesus Christ, is to responsibly use the resources of First Presbyterian Church of Newhall, wherever we find a neighbor in need. We are committed to meeting mission needs in our local community, across the nation, and globally, by sending money, food, clothing, volunteers, or whatever else is needed.



During the Month of October, our church will be requesting donations to give to PREP (Partnership for re-entry program) Ministries. PREP's purpose is to give support to inmates in their focus and effort toward reentering community. The relationship begins with contact with the

Catholic chaplain who explains PREP and offers an application to the inmate. The next step is either a prison visit or frequent correspondence with the coordinator. At this time a mentor begins to initiate a relationship with the inmate.

It is hoped that this becomes a lasting relationship as parolee and mentor journey together, always with a focus on recovery. Faith becomes an integral part of the time together, as both parties grow deeper in the realization that God is the source of love and life.

Upon release, the mentor accompanies the parolee to the many different places that need to be put in place: parole, DMV, general relief, social security, employment office, transportation... to name a few. In preparation for release, inmates participate in TURNING POINT, a program of self-help/self-development modules. These modules focus on areas of transition and recovery necessary for returning to community.

PREP has been successful in supporting parolees to re-enter society and become productive members of the community.

LIVING WATERS MISSION TRIP TO LAOS, OCT. 24 TO NOV. 11, 2016, THE 15TH YEAR OF MISSION TRIPS TO LAOS BY LAO PARTNERS

Five Lao Partners of University Presbyterian Church, Fresno will be joined by Jack Irwin, Art Moore and Scott Bullock of First Presbyterian Church of Newhall. The Lao Partners' Team will work with the Lao Evangelical Church to visit all seven installations of the Living Waters "Clean Water System" that have been installed in prior years by Lao Partners to provide villages with clean water. We will check out the clean water systems for maintenance and repair and conduct advanced training for the local operators. We will also conduct hygiene education for community leaders at each village or site. We will also visit the village of Ban Houy Nam Youn near Vientiane to sample and test the water of the new well the village has installed, so that we can plan on installing a LWW system there in 2017.

Lao Partners is a mission founded through the University Pres. Church, Fresno in 2002. For 14 years Lao Partners has assisted the Lao Evangelical Church in ministering to the needs of the people of Laos. Projects have included computer centers, medical facilities, sports equipment and uniforms, equipment for schools, and seven clean water systems. In 2015 the Newhall Pres Church joined Lao Partners, when Jack Irwin and Art Moore joined the mission team. Laos is a developing country, which was a colony of France until independence in 1954. It was established as the People's Democratic Republic (PDR) of Laos in 1975. It suffered extensive warfare that spilled over from the Vietnam War. There are 6.6 million people of 143 identified ethnic groups, the most populous being Lao and Hmong. Official language is Lao (not much English spoken). Laos is landlocked by Vietnam, Cambodia, Thailand, Myanmar and China. 58% of the population is Buddhist, 35% ethnic religions and 3.5% Christian. Presently, the Christian churches are growing and ministering to the needs of all Laotians.

Join the Team: The cost for each team member is about \$2300, including international airfare from LA to Vientiane, and in-Laos travel, hotels, and meals. The cost also includes equipment and education supplies we will take with us or purchase in Vientiane. We are asking you to consider joining our team. We need prayer and financial support.
