When an interviewer asked Abraham Heschel what he believed his greatest gift was, the Rabbi replied, "My ability to be SURPRISED." Summer is a season of change and surprise. People wander away from their routines and have experiences they don't have during the long work days of Fall through Spring. Surprise creates a sense of wonder in a human. Heschel reasoned, "Without awe, wonder, and amazement, no reverence is possible."

Scientists have discovered that our brains gravitate to surprise as much as our best religious yearnings do. Neuroscientists have discovered that we derive more pleasure from surprises than from other sensations. When human subjects in a Baylor College of Medicine study received computer-generated squirts of either tropical fruit juice or tap water in their mouths, scientists viewing the MRI's noted that it was the element of surprise—not the pleasurable effect of one taste over the other—that elicited the greatest surges of dopamine. More dopamine reached the anterior cingulate cortex of the brain when unexpected stimuli triggered a reflexive neutral response. Basically, surprise is pleasing to us.

Let me illustrate: A little girl was talking to her grandmother. She asked, "Grandma, how old are you?" The grandmother replied, "Now dear, you shouldn't ask people that question. Most grownups don't like to tell their age." The following day, the girl had another question. "Grandma, how much do you weigh?" Once again the grandmother replied, "Oh, honey, you shouldn't ask grownups how much they weigh. It isn't polite." The next day the little girl was back with a big smile on her face. She said, "Grandma, I know how old you are. You're 62. And you weigh 140 pounds." The grandmother was a bit surprised and said, "My goodness, how do you know?" The girl smiled and said, "You left your driver's license on the table, and I read it." Grandmother said, "Oh, so that's how you found out." The girl said, "That's right, and I also saw on your driver's license that you flunked sex."

That power of surprise is one of the reasons live sporting events keep attracting people. (Weren't the NBA finals exciting between the Cavaliers and Warriors?) There is a dopamine rush every time a baseball goes flying out of the park. Or when Keven Durant pulls up for a long distance 3 pointer we again are amazed.

It's also why we can't tickle ourselves. Unpredictability is the key to tickling, and our brain cancels out the element of surprise when we attempt to tickle ourselves.

So, this summer, get out of your routine. Find time for rejuvenation. Allow yourself to be surprised by life. For a Christian that experience can be described as the AWE of GOD.


Many Modern Martyrs - by Art Moore

Recently one of the members of our men's Monday night Bible study (alias—Bible Boys) presented each of us with a small book entitled <u>The Lost Letters of Pergamum</u> by Bruce W. Longenecker. The book is a novel (fiction) but it accurately depicts the lives of Christians in a pagan world in Asia Minor (Turkey) and Galilee during the first century AD. Among other things, it vividly describes the extremely horrible treatment of Christians during the reign of Roman Emperor Domitian (81-96 AD). In particular, the atrocities perpetrated as part of coliseum "games" are described. It is an exciting story, and I highly recommend it to anyone over 18 years of age.

The book is characteristic of many novels, movies and articles that we have seen over the years, related to the persecution of Christians. With this, we sometimes tend to think of Christian persecution/martyrdom as something primarily relegated to ancient history. But this is wrong. The fact is that more Christians are being persecuted today than in ancient times. (Of course there are a lot more of us to persecute now.) According to Open Doors Watch List approximately 215 million (or one in twelve) Christians experience persecution today.

The causes or "engines" of persecution are many and varied, but not surprisingly 70% of all persecution comes from Islamic extremism. Of course, that means that a significant amount comes from other sources. In fact, the worst (listed as #1) in the entire world is North Korea which is communist/atheistic. In India (#15), the main engine is extreme Hinduism together with religious nationalism. Even in our neighbor Mexico (#41), a nominally Christian nation, persecution comes from organized corruption (i.e. drug cartels). In a few cases the dominate branch of Christianity in a county will persecute Evangelicals and Pentecostals working there.

While I was preparing this article, I was called by my financial advisor. He is a Roman Catholic Syrian and has considerable knowledge and experience about the Middle East. He emailed me the graph below:



As you can see, the most persecution is in the Middle East, with countries like Egypt, Syria, and Iraq suffering the largest percentage losses in Christian population.

In a Fox News article entitled *Christianity's Prospects of Surviving in its Birth- place are Grim,* the author (Perry Cliarmonte) describes the situation in Egypt, Iraq and Syria.

As you probably know, in ancient times Christianity flourished in Alexandria, Egypt and in Antioch of Syria. These Churches may have preceded the Church in Rome. Yet today, we read about the Muslim Brotherhood and ISIS attacking Christians in Egypt. We read about how 200,000 Coptic (Egyptian) Christians have fled the country.

In a "World News" article by Heba Farouk Mahfouz entitled *Coptic Christians Describe Bus Attack in Egypt: Even the Little Children Were Targets* she re-

lates eyewitness accounts of an attack by ISIS that killed at least 30 people and injured 26. The attackers shouted before firing their weapons, "Either recite the Islamic shahada creed, live as practicing Muslims, or be killed." Many shouted back "We are Christians and will die Christians." (At least 30 did!)

In Iraq we can find similar stories.

On a brighter note, there is an article by Charles White of Metro.co.uk, "Christian Church Destroyed by ISIS Rebuilt by Muslim Residents." The story explains how residents of recently liberated Mosul are working together to restore a

church and show that: "Mosul is yours as it's ours." This can give us assurance that there are a great many Muslims who deplore Christian persecution as much as we do.

Now, back in the good of USA, we can be extremely grateful that we can worship where, when and as we please. But the Church in the USA suffers in a completely different way than in the countries I just mentioned. The USA Church suffers from a culture of indifference and secularism. We hear, "Spring Break – not Easter Vacation;" "My kids can't come to Sunday School because of softball practice on Sunday mornings;" "I don't believe in organized religion" and "All the church wants is your money." How we counter that is a subject for future discussion, but if we were better informed about the persecution of Christians in the rest of the world, we might better appreciate what we have here.

With that in mind, I suggest that we have adult classes addressing "Modern Martyrdom." (My financial adviser might be a good resource.) We might give to an organization like Open Doors and pray for our brothers and sisters in the rest of the world. Jack Irwin suggests that we need to be ready to welcome, help and accommodate Christian refugees as they are forced to seek asylum in the USA.

In any case, we all need to understand, personally and deeply, that Christian persecution/martyrdom is NOT just the subject of ancient history but exists and is terrible and violent even in the 21st century.

Mathew 5: 10 Blessed are those who are persecuted because of righteousness, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.

11 "Blessed are you when people insult you, persecute you and falsely say all kinds of evil against you because of me.

12 Rejoice and be glad, because great is your reward in heaven, for in the same way they persecuted the prophets who were before you.

Bring a lawn chair. Many folks from First Pres attended last year and had a great time. So did the Band! Hope to see you there!





Our charities this year were: Help the Children (canned food items) Amor (spare change)



On August 22, we will start a new






