PASTOR COLUMN OCTOBER 2017

This month we celebrate 500 years since the date of Martin Luther posting his 95 thesis (or series of questions to which he invited debate with the Roman Church). This, in short sparked what we call the Reformation of the church. To celebrate our Adult Ministry is showing a new film on the life of Martin Luther. On Reformation Sunday (the closest date to October 31st when the 95 thesis was posted.) Jack Irwin who has a Master's of Divinity from Fuller as well as a wealth of information on the Reformation will be preaching, allowing me to lead a class on the history of the Reformation for Adult Education at 4 O'clock in the Sanctuary.

Reform of the Church of Jesus, the Christ, has happened throughout all of Christian history. Do you remember the quiet Monk Telemachus?

When Honorius was Emperor of Rome, about the vear 400 A.D., the great Coliseum of Rome was often filled to overflowing with spectators. These had come from far and near to view the state games. Part of the sport consisted in watching as human beings battled with wild beasts or against one another until one or the other was killed. The assembled multitude made Roman holiday of such sport and found its highest delight in the death of a human being. It was on such a day when the vast crowd was watching the contest that a Syrian monk by the name of Telemachus stood up in the vast arena. Telemachus was torn by the utter disregard for the value of human life and so he leaped into the arena in the midst of the gladiatorial show and cried out, This thing is not right! This thing must stop!"Because he was interfering with their pleasure, the authorities gave the command for Telemachus to be run through with a sword, which was done. Thus he died, but dving he kindled a flame in the hearts and consciences of thinking persons. History records that because of this within a few months the gladiatorial combats began to decline and very shortly they passed from history. Why? Because one man dared to speak out for what he felt was right.

We each participate in reforming as we read, discuss, and live out our faith in the faithfulness of God each new day.

We are committed to meeting mission needs in our local community, across the nation, and globally, by sending money, food, clothing, volunteers, or whatever else is needed.

AMOR October Homebuilding Update

Twelve of us, supported by this congregation, had yet another successful homebuilding trip this fall. We completing the framing, paper, wire, doors, windows, roof and first coat of stucco on three sides. If we only had one or two more of you we could have gotten stucco on the last wall.

We had a real treat coming home as Gail and Cam Stewart invited us to stop by their new home in Oceanside where they knocked themselves out with appetizers, hamburgers and hot dogs. No stop at McDonalds this year! It was so good to see and talk with them and to see their absolutely beautiful and huge home with a designer backyard. They want to make this stop a tradition with our future trips. What a gift of hospitality that we will definitely take them up on!

Leaving church on Friday morning, we had one of our smoothest and quickest trip down to the border. We even got to Tom's Farm for lunch before they opened at 11am. But getting into Mexico wasn't a great experience. Last year Fernando, the AMOR field supervisor, had built a relationship with the Mexican border authorities and we breezed through. You have to understand that they are getting serious about stopping the flow of guns coming in from the USA. (time for my soapbox – as Americans I hear it said that Mexico is out of control with their drug cartels. I say its all our fault...our insatiable appetite for drugs which funds these cartels with unbelievable amounts of our money, that buys power, corruption, guns and even small armies. We are the root cause of the evil there. I could go on...) but to get back to our crossing, the Mexico government just swapped out the administrators at the San Ysidro border the week before. (My educated guess is they do this to prevent corruption. It is kind of like what we do with our border agents as we come into the USA. They have them change their booths randomly about every twenty minutes so that the cartels can't tell their drug runners, "get in the second lane as we've bought off that agent".) Anyway, we get to the border with our completed detailed cargo list forms and they say, "What are these? We've never seen these before." Fernando negotiates with them and they tell us to just go to the Otay Mesa border crossing. So off we go a twenty-minute drive. There they know the forms. They review and give them a big green stamp. Sweet! But then they tell us we cannot cross there as we have a trailer on the van. We must go back to San Ysidro. Well, we are now in Mexico and have to get in line to cross back into the USA. The Mexican authorities open a gate and we get in the front of a mile-long line. Nice! But then one of our vehicles gets pulled into secondary as one of our names comes up on a USA bad guy list. Hey its just a identical name fellas! Still we are delayed another thirty minutes. We drive back to the San Ysidro crossing. All goes smoothly since we have the green stamp. But then our last vehicle, Art's truck, gets randomly flagged for Mexican secondary inspection! They x-ray the truck as Art and Bob stand behind a concrete wall. They see something they don't like and make Art empty the large metal toolbox and re-x-ray. It turns out to be that Art's nail gun hammer (ramset) looked suspicious. Finally, after almost an hour they are cleared and our caravan proceeds through Tijuana. It's still light when we arrive at the AMOR campsite in rural TJ. We set up our tents, etc., and luckily we planned to have the local women prepare our dinner on Friday and Saturday nights. All was ready for us and good. A lovely evening.

At the job site on Saturday it was hot low 90's but we managed. The family was a lovely young couple and a father. They worked with us and made us a hot lunch on Sunday. Michael, the AMOR field rep, brought his wife and their one and one-half year-old son, James, to the jobsite on Sunday. He had his own little hammer, was starting to talk (all the time) and was such a joy to have around. We worked hard and completed the framing on Saturday. Sunday we completed the roof, paper, door and windows, and a coat of stucco. It is amazing to me how our ragtag group of amateurs, whose average age was sixty-three, (brought down by Amanda and Alex from 67), can accomplish so much in two days. Art gave the family the keys late Sunday afternoon. Pure joy. Then back to the camp for our traditional lasagna dinner where we invite Fernando and Michael's families. Wonderful fellow-ship after working hard building for a poor family. Our next trip will be two weeks after Easter. Hopefully by then the border crossing into Mexico will be back to normal, but we may not bring the trailer or Art's ramset!





THE DAY THE WORLD ENDED (Or So It Seemed)

It was Monday October 8, 2017. My youngest daughter's in-laws had to evacuate their home in Santa Rosa as furious wild fires rampaged through the heart of this heavily populated residential community. They moved in with their daughter's family. Then that family had to evacuate. Then my best friend called to tell me that his son, a builder who also lived in Santa Rosa, had to evacuate his home after he watered down the roof and that a home he was building had itself been consumed in the inferno. I was visiting my oldest daughter and my five-day old granddaughter when my four-year-old grandson came into the house screaming from a freshly- broken arm. And it all came in the withering aftermath of devastating hurricanes in Texas, Florida and Puerto Rico. And, that very morning, my dog died. I crawled under my bed and waited to

be crushed by an earthquake. Much of our country was left in an unquenchable need for emergency relief and aid. (And the stock market soared while the palaces and mansions retained their glory.)

If we read the Bible, go to church on Sundays, profess to be disciples of the bodily resurrected Messiah of Israel, try to see the world and all of its happenings through a biblical lens and believe (trust?) God's promises, what are we to make of all of this? These are the very same things talked about by Isaiah, Jeremiah, the other prophets, the psalmists and by Jesus himself ["*There will be famines and earthquakes in various places*" (Matt 240)]. They all lamented just like we did on October 8th: "*Oh God…You have caused the land to quake; you have torn it open; …You have made your people suf-fer hard things*" (Ps 60). "*You have rejected us and abased us, and have made us like sheep for slaughter*" (Ps 44). "O God, why do you cast us off for ever? Why does your anger smoke against the sheep of your pasture? Why do you hold back your hand?" (Ps. 74).

This is where a quite odd word comes into play: *hevel.* And it comes in the strangest book of the Bible, *Ecclesiastes*. Its teachings are presented by, well, the "*Teacher*." To make sure we take seriously what the Teacher has to teach, the book is attributed to the smartest and the richest (most successful) man in the bible, Solomon. If you open your pew bible, you will read: "*Vanity of vanities, says the Teacher, vanity of vanities*! *All is vanity*." But, importantly, that's not what the Teacher said. He actually said, "*Hevel of all hevels….All is hevel. What do people gain from all the toil at which they toil under the sun*?" He even characterized all of his own wisdom and riches as "*but a chasing after wind*." *Hevel* does not mean *vain* (at least as we understand it). And I believe it is even misleading to translate it as *meaningless*, although that is closer. It means "smoke" or "vapor"—something that is illusory and blows away at the slightest breeze, something elusive or deceptively unattainable. And he uses it 38 times. Solomon worked his entire life to acquire wisdom and wealth and he winds up declaring it all to be worthless, to be hevel. Why? What is the lesson here? It's in 5:16: "*This is what I have seen to be good: it is fitting to eat and drink and find enjoyment in all the toil with which one toils under the sun the few days of the life God gives us.*" When we toil under the illusion that we can control outcomes, it will all turn out to be *hevel*. But if we release all outcomes to our good and loving Creator, we can begin to enjoy all the goodness God has given us and will give us according to His unfailing promises.



I, personally, had to understand my own powerlessness, that I am not in control but I have a part, and perhaps a very important part to play. That is what the Teacher is talking about, i.e. to not chase the wind, to not try to use our wisdom to grasp at smoke or vapor. How presumptuous of me to think that I can control outcomes. When my goals and all my planning turn out to be *hevel*, I wind up "*eating in darkness, in much vexation and sickness and resentment.*" But if I release all of how everything is going to turn out to God, I am now free to "*eat and drink and find enjoyment in all the toil with which one toils under the sun the few days of the life God gives us; for this is our lot.*" I certainly have my role—because God has strangely

deputized me and us as His agents to carry out His plan of restoring fallen creation. But I am not the one in charge of how it all turns out. And it all leads to a great unburdening—and relief.

Psalm 73 starts out with, "Such are the wicked; always at ease, they increase in riches. All in vain I have kept my heart clean and washed my hands in innocence." But this is how it ends, "God is the strength of my heart and my portion for ever. Indeed, those who are far from you will perish; you put an end to those who are false to you. But for me it is good to be near God; I have made the Lord God my refuge, to tell of all your works." You bet! Me too!
